SERMON

Let me begin with a story.

e.g. The father of a friend of mine was mugged on Clapham Common some years ago.

He was only 15 minutes' walk away from home, but was so badly beaten that he could hardly walk.

He managed to crawl to the main road.

People just passed him by.

He managed to get to his feet and stopped a taxi.

When the taxi driver saw the state of him he refused to take him because he said he might be sick in his taxi because he thought he was drunk, but he wasn't.

There are all kinds of reasons why we are unwilling to help someone.

He hailed a second taxi and asked him to drive him home.

At first he refused.

He asked him if he were drunk.

He answered no & explained that he had been robbed and mugged.

This taxi-driver agreed to drive him home.

Who is my neighbour?

The parable of the Good Samaritan. Or was Jesus relating something that had actually happened?

What did it mean to the people listening to Jesus?

What does it mean to us 21st century readers?

We must be aware of certain insinuations and innuendoes that the people in the crowd round Jesus were picking up.

We would interpret the words 'half-dead' to mean unconscious.

They would have had the picture of a man they would have assumed to be a Jew lying unconscious and naked in the middle of this terrifying terrain.

The 17-mile route from Jerusalem to Jericho descends 3600 feet through hot and hostile desert.

The route was narrow with many rocky areas and sudden turns.

It was notorious for hijackers is also true of more recent times.

Anyone travelling that route alone, especially carrying goods, was reckless and foolhardy.

THE PRIEST WAS THE FIRST TO COME THAT WAY. WHY DID THE PRIEST PASS BY?

- 1 A famous Jewish scholar [Ben Sirach] before the time of Jesus had warned against helping a sinner.
- Fear. The bandits might still be lurking behind the rocks.
- 3 If anyone else saw him with the man, they could accuse him and kill him.
- 4 Leviticus 19:18 defines a neighbour as 'one of your own people'. In Jesus' account this man could neither speak nor was he clothed, the two things which identified where a person was from.
- If the man died, and he can't be sure about that, and he's within 6 feet of him he will defile himself. This would be humiliating and it is costly in time and money and reputation to go through the rites of purification.

While we are booing the baddie, Jesus' Pharisaic audience would have applauded when they discovered that the priest decided the laws of ceremonial duty were more important than all other regulations and traditions.

THE LEVITE WAS THE SECOND PERSON TO COME THAT WAY. WHY DID THE LEVITE PASS BY?

Levites were assistant priests.

The audience would assume that he was aware of the priest in front of him.

He would have in his mind:

- 1 The constant danger of robbers.
- 2 The example of the higher-ranking priest.
- 3 If he moved in where the priest stayed away, he'd be accusing the priest.

Reasons always present themselves when we want to avoid something.

It is said that "the road to hell is paved with good intentions."

It's also paved with good reasons!

THE THIRD TRAVELLER

3 categories of people are allowed to assist with Temple worship — priests, Levites, laymen.

So the audience think they know what is coming next in the story.

Jesus injects shock waves into this story.

This layman is a Samaritan.

Samaritan: Detested by Jews, as of mixed race with Jewish background, but not pure Jews;

Also follows the Old Testament Law of the Jews;

He would have defined neighbour as a fellow countryman;

He would have assumed the wounded man was a Jew; so could have ignored him.

But, the Samaritan: looked, saw, and he had compassion;

he acted, tending his wounds, putting him on his own donkey;

he himself walked alongside, like a slave;

he took a huge risk — he went into a Jewish town with him.

WHO IS MY NEIGHBOUR?

MESSAGE FOR US

The NIV says that in order to justify himself, the lawyer asks, "Who is my neighbour?"

But, The Message has the phrase: "Looking for a loophole, he asked Jesus who was his neighbour."

We 21st century listeners are in danger of hearing only a fraction of the implied meaning in Jesus' answer.

We are in danger of believing that Jesus answers: "Anyone in need, even if he is an outsider or an

unknown stranger — like this wounded man."

But that is not what Jesus says.

Jesus refrains from answering the lawyer's question.

He declines to tell the lawyer who his neighbour is.

Instead, he answers the unasked questions: "To whom must he become a neighbour?"

"To whom must we become a neighbour?"

"To whom must I become a neighbour?"

In this story **the person who has become a neighbour** is not the wounded man but the Samaritan.

It is the Samaritan who has become a neighbour to the wounded man in his time of need.

Even more radically, Jesus encourages the lawyer to revise his view of the Law.

"The Law of Moses is good," Jesus confirms.

But love is always prepared to go beyond it.

Jesus adds by implication the unspoken words about himself: "I myself am the Samaritan."

Who is my neighbour? To whom must we be a neighbour? You I must each be a good neighbour.

Jesus loves us into loving & being a good neighbour to anyone.

As <u>you</u> follow Jesus, let his Holy Spirit love you into loving others, as Jesus loves you. Amen.
