MEDITATION The psalmist writes:

"He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will

find refuge." (Psalm 91:4)

It is not unknown after a fire to find a dead hen with live chicks under her wings. An article in National Geographic several years ago provided an interesting picture of God's wings. After a forest fire in Yellowstone National Park, forest rangers began their trek up a mountain to assess the inferno's damage.

One ranger found a bird literally petrified in ashes, perched statuesquely on the ground at the base of a tree. Somewhat sickened by the eerie sight, he carefully knocked over the bird with a stick. When he gently struck it, 3 tiny chicks scurried from under their dead mother's wings. The loving mother bird, keenly aware of impending disaster, had carried her offspring to the base of the tree

and had gathered them under her wings, instinctively knowing that the toxic smoke would rise. She could have flown to safety but had refused to abandon her babies. Then the blaze had arrived & the heat had scorched her small body, but the mother hen had remained steadfast. Because she had been willing to die, those under the cover of her wings would live.

I seem to recall seeing the same thing on a TV nature programme not so very many years ago.

"He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge." (Psalm 91:4)

You might like to take a few moments now, or later in the day, to ponder this story. The psalmist knew of it all those centuries ago and there are those who have witnessed it in recent times. The Psalmist saw a parallel between the hen bird and God. We shall see in our Gospel reading that Jesus identifies himself with this kind of love. In a few weeks on Good Friday we shall be reminded again of Jesus' sacrifice for us.

Luke 13:31-35; Philippians 3:17-4:1

Luke 13:31-35.

- 31 At that time some Pharisees came to Jesus and said to him, "Leave this place and go somewhere else. Herod wants to kill you."
- 32 He replied, "Go tell that fox, 'I will drive out demons and heal people today and tomorrow, and on the third day I will reach my goal.'
- 33 In any case, I must keep going today and tomorrow and the next day for surely no prophet can die outside Jerusalem!

SERMON SUCH LOVE.

Jesus says: " how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing!" (Luke 13:34b)

Luke 13:31-35 is interesting passage because of the insight it gives into the life of Jesus, behind the scenes. Jesus shows both courage and love.

1 It's curious to find some Pharisees warning Jesus against Herod. Why was this?

Did Herod get the Pharisees to pass on a death threat?

Were the Pharisees willing to cooperate because they hoped Jesus would move from Peraea to Judaea where they had more power?

Does this passage suggest that not all the Pharisees were hostile to Jesus?

Is this passage in Luke showing that there were even Pharisees who admired & respected Jesus.

Or, are some of the Pharisees actually genuinely warning Jesus he was in danger, & even advising him to seek safety.

2 The Gospels give a one-sided view of the Pharisees, but the Jews knew there were good & bad Pharisees.

Some made a display of their strict religious practices.

But some were God-loving Pharisees who lived humbly in faith & charity.

It's difficult to know the proportion of good to bad Pharisees.

The Jews divided the Pharisees into 7 different classes:

(i) The Shoulder Pharisees.

Performed their good deeds in such a manner as to be seen by all.

It was as if they wore their good deeds on their shoulder.

(ii) The Wait-a-little Pharisees.

They could always find an excuse for putting off a good deed until tomorrow.

(iii) The Bruised or Bleeding Pharisees.

No Jewish Rabbi could be seen talking to any woman in the street, not even wife, mother, sister.

Certain Pharisees took it further.

They wouldn't even look at a woman in the street.

They even shut their eyes to avoid seeing a woman.

So bumped into walls & bruised themselves.

They exhibited their bruises as special badges of extraordinary piety.

Hence the term — *The Bruised or Bleeding Pharisees.*

(iv) The Pestle and Mortar or Humped-backed Pharisees.

They walked bent double in a false & cringing humility.

(v) The Ever-reckoning Pharisees.

They were ever reckoning up their good deeds, & striking a balance sheet of profit & loss with God.

(vi) The Timid or Fearing Pharisees.

They lived in fear of the wrath of God.

They were haunted by their religion.

(vii) The God-loving Pharisees.

They were like Abraham.

They lived in faith & charity.

Today. We still need to beware of stereotyping or showing prejudice against certain people or people in certain professions. I'm ashamed to say that, in the past, lists were even published of the most distrusted people related to their particular job!

3 This passage shows us Jesus talking to a king, or, more accurately, sending someone else with the message.

He (Jesus) replied, "Go tell that fox, 'I will drive out demons and heal people today and tomorrow, and on the third day I will reach my goal.'

In any case, I must keep going today and tomorrow and the next day — for surely no prophet can die outside Jerusalem!

Herod Antipas was king of Galilee and was determined to stop Jesus.

Jesus referred to him as that fox.

To the Jew the fox was a symbol of 3 things:

- (i) The sliest of animals.
- (ii) The most destructive of animals.
- (iii) The symbol of a worthless and insignificant man.

It takes a brave man to call the reigning king a fox.

However, Jesus took his orders from God, the King of kings.

It would be good for us to remember that fact when we are afraid of what someone else might say or think of us.

Jesus says what he must do, today, tomorrow & the third day.

He says on the third day he will reach his goal.

The third day meant: in a short time; or

at the end of a definite time; or when he has completed his work.

For us the third day has the significance of being when Jesus rose from the dead.

4 This passage tells us of Jesus' lament over Jerusalem.

If we think about the context, it shows how little we really know of Jesus' life.

Luke probably records Jesus' lament over Jerusalem here because it is related to the event he's writing about. However, it probably occurred as Jesus approached Jerusalem, as Matthew said in his account.

Surely Jesus couldn't have spoken in this way unless, prior to this, he had more than once gone with his offer of love to Jerusalem. Jesus must have had more contacts with Jerusalem than Matthew, Mark & Luke record. Therefore, this emphasises that in the Gospels we have only a small part of the events of Jesus' life.

It shows Jesus was deeply concerned about the final fate of Jerusalem.

Jesus describes Jerusalem as habitually rejecting & even killing God's messengers.

But God didn't reject Jerusalem out of hand.

Jesus would often have been willing to gather her children together, but they wouldn't come.

The responsibility of the Jews for their fate is brought home with the words, "but you were not willing!"

When a nation or individual persists in rejecting God, the end is inevitable.

Jerusalem is forsaken — God no longer lives there. Jesus' return at the Second Coming will bring recognition of his Messiahship.

There's a tenderness in the imagery of a hen & her chicks that we thought about earlier in the service. This is what Jesus did for us. Being loved this much should make a difference in your life and my life. Remember the One who loves you, and then be different because of it.

One of the most hurtful things in life is to go to someone and offer true love and have it rejected or thrown back in our face. That's what happened to Jesus in Jerusalem. Jesus continues to come to people, but people continue to reject Jesus. To reject the love of God is to be in peril of the wrath of God.

Remember that in all our circumstances, Jesus comes to you and me. I pray that we may always accept his comfort and love. And then, in the name of Jesus show care and love to others.
