Wherever you are sharing in this Easter Sunday Service, whether you are alone or sharing in this service with others, a warm welcome to you. Today, we are invited to enter into the joy and wonder of the resurrection and the presence of the risen Lord. Like the women who went to the tomb to honour Jesus with spices, God draws us away from the empty tomb to discover the risen Christ himself leading us into new ways of living after his crucifixion.

A Reflective Illustration:

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High up on the moors in the winter season, men go out and set fire to the old heather.

By now the heather is all twisted and gnarled; it no longer produces food for the birds and even the moorland sheep are in danger of pulling their teeth out tugging at it.

The heather has become useless to the life it usually sustains. So it is burnt, but with controlled burning. In the flames, it may look as if it is totally destroyed but it is not.

Under the ground its roots are safe and the men make sure the fire is not too fierce to reach the roots.

In the spring the old heather is gone but little shoots appear.

The heather is rising from the earth and soon will appear as fresh and as useful as ever.

What was destroyed is back with the newness of life.

Homily: What does the empty tomb mean for us?

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen! (Luke 24:5b - 6a)"

I invite you to imagine that you are one of the women who cared for Jesus – to spend the next few moments putting yourself in this role.

And now, through senseless and unspeakable cruelty, your revered and beloved leader and Lord, is dead.

As far as you are concerned, the world has ended – and you feel hopeless. Yet, to honour Jesus' body, and out of pure devotion, you go to the tomb taking spices and ointments.

You are grief-stricken. Your eyes still full of tears - the journey to the grave is difficult.

When you arrived, the tomb is empty...apart from the strips of linen carelessly discarded, as well as, the burial cloth that had been wrapped around Jesus' head is neatly folded-up by itself, separate from the linen (according to John's Gospel).

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You are terrified. Perplexed. Amazed. All at the same time. You do not know what to make of all that you have seen and heard.

You had thought this was the definitive end. As far as you were concerned, there was no meaningful tomorrow. But something has happened beyond your human ability to grasp. The stone had been rolled back, the tomb is empty, the linen cloths crumpled, your crucified Lord and leader has left behind, the trappings of death.

What does the empty tomb mean? Does this mean Jesus is in fact alive? This is certainly unchartered waters. God, yet again, has confounded human expectations — all that happened next at the tomb confirms that Jesus is indeed alive.

It is strange that however many years we have travelled with God, experience God's presence, believed we have known God's ways – we can still be left perplexed and amazed. Tragedy and hopelessness can shatter our world. We can feel that life has ended. And yet, in the midst of it all we can discover God bringing us through to the other side.

The price of God's new life is always the same: a letting go of our fixed, pre-packaged ideas of what God is like, of what we are like and of what our neighbour is like. It is a call to get out of the safety of the boat and to walk on unchartered waters. Even, perhaps, to surf adventurously down cascading waterfalls, having no idea where we are going. The only certainty is knowing in our heart of hearts that 'God is with us'.

There can be no end to our human ability to describe God's power. In the death and resurrection of His Son, God shatters the bounds of our human knowing. The mystery of the empty tomb is that nothing, not illness, death, cruelty, deception, denial, betrayal (and whatever you may wish to add to this list) can separate us from the love of God and God's gift of newness of life.

The Apostle Paul in (1 Corinthians 15:19 says, '*If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied*'. Paul does not go on to say: 'we are most to be pitied...because we would not go to heaven'. No! Paul's picture of the resurrection of Jesus is not just a solution to a personal problem of life and death — rather, Paul's picture of Jesus' resurrection is cosmic and universal in its scope – it is about fixing everything and returning everything to the way God intended it.

If this cosmic restoration of everything as it pertains to Christ's resurrection is not in our vision – and therefore drive who we are and how we live our lives – then maybe, our hope of the Resurrection is too small.

There is a story in the Celtic tradition: A man was once asked, 'What do you gain by regularly praying to God?' The man replied, 'Nothing...but let me tell you what I lost: anger, ego, greed, insecurity and fear of death. Sometimes the answer to our prayers is not gaining but losing, which ultimately is the gain.'

Friends, is this a clue into resurrection living? Dying, to discover more spacious living?

For as in Adam all died, even so in Christ shall all be made alive. Amen
