Talk for all (on video)

A couple of weeks ago we went to visit some relatives up north in Lancashire. We hadn't seen them since before lockdown. The relatives we were visiting had been to church on the Sunday morning. We heard that, during the service, the three-year-old pointed at the person playing the piano and asked his Mum and Dad, 'Is that God on the piano?' Maybe the person playing the piano was very good at it - who knows? It was certainly

a very good question for a three-year-old to ask - or even a thirty-year-old. Where is God, and does God hear us when we say our prayers to him?

When Jesus lived on Earth, he used to walk around the roads with his friends and disciples. Jesus used to teach them, and he used to heal people. When he was near the end of his life, Jesus knew that they would have to manage without him. So he told them that he would still be with them but not in a body where they could touch him.

He said, 'Where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them.' Some of you may be here by zoom, and some of you are here in person. But together there are more than two or three of us. So Jesus says he is with us. It's difficult to understand, but he hears us when we pray and when we sing hymns to him. We can also know what God wants to say to us when we read the Bible. Sometimes we get a strong feeling that Jesus is saying something to us through the Bible - or through what our Junior Church leader or the preacher says to us. Or it can even be that the person on the piano is playing so enthusiastically that we feel that God is in his or her piano playing. So yes, in a very strange way, that can be God on the piano.


Sermon (on video)

I want to show you some pictures of galaxies.



Here is a photo of two galaxies called M81 and M82. They are both about 12 million light years from Earth. This means that light would take 12 million years to reach us. So what we're seeing now shows them as they were 12 million years ago. Even at warp speed I don't think we can ever visit them. But they're actually quite close to us as the universe goes. In galaxy terms they are our neighbours. The two galaxies are much closer to each other than they are to us. So close, that they're actually orbiting around each other like the Moon orbits round the Earth.

I have close-up photos of each galaxy. This is M81.



M81 is a classic spiral. It's like our own Milky Way galaxy but a bit bigger. It has a giant black hole at its centre.



M82 looks quite different. Partly, it's because we see it edge-on through the disk so we can't see the spirals. It's sometimes called the Cigar Galaxy. It also looks different because it has hydrogen spewing out it's centre – here seen in red – at 1000 miles per second. M82 is called a starburst galaxy. A few hundred million years ago M81 and M82 came close together. The gravitational forces between them triggered the formation of lots of stars in M82 – hence the name 'starburst'. The extreme activity produces a super-wind that heads off at high speed into intergalactic space.

I could sit and look at photos like this all day. They're so beautiful. The galaxies are so large, distant and remote. How puny and small we are in comparison to this vast action played out over hundreds of millions of years.

I could sit and contemplate these pictures all day. But if that were all I did I wouldn't be doing my job as an astrophysicist. Sitting in wonder does not achieve anything by itself. I have to get to work with my equations, write simulation programs, read what others have found out, and figure out what is going on with these galaxies. I have to do some hard thinking, publish my results and go to conferences to tell others. I have to be committed. As it's been said, 'Science is 1% inspiration, 99% perspiration'.

So there are two sides to science. It's an affair of the heart. Astrophysicists are motivated by the beauty and wonder of the universe. It's also an affair of the mind. We have to be committed, work hard, and apply our mental faculties.

I now want to turn to Paul's letter to the Christians in Rome. Paul drew out two similar aspects to being a Christian. Paul wrote,

'If you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.'

It's not quite the same as doing astrophysics – in fact it's very different - but there are the same two elements of heart and mind. On the one hand, believing with our heart. On the other hand, the action and commitment. The two go together, and both are necessary.

Some people think that believing is a matter of the mind. There is that to it. We assent to Christian doctrine. But belief is primarily of the heart. I know people who became Christians because they were convinced by logical argument. But this is rare. Most people become Christians because God becomes real to them in way that is beyond logical argument.

I look at pictures of galaxies and the beauty and wonder hits me in a way that is immediate and goes beyond conscious thinking. Even more so with God. God becomes real to us, and evokes a response within us. Faith is a gift from God. It's not a human accomplishment.

Then there's the other aspect. It's right that we contemplate God in our heart. But there's more to being a Christian. We should declare with our mouth that 'Jesus is Lord'. This sounds easy but there's a lot to it. First of all it means that we should come out in the open that we follow Jesus.

It's no good keeping quiet and hiding our faith from others. And by declaring openly that Jesus is our Lord, we are committing ourselves to making that true. If we say that Jesus is our Lord when he in fact is not Lord of our lives, then we make ourselves hypocrites and dishonour Jesus. This is a matter of action and commitment. It's something we can decide to do – or not. We may be motivated in our heart, but it is in our mind that we decide to make it so and act accordingly. To repeat what Paul wrote,

'If you declare with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved.'

The context in which Paul wrote these words was his concern for his own people. As he wrote elsewhere, Paul described himself as a 'Hebrew of Hebrews'. Paul had been brought up and trained as a Pharisee. He couldn't work out why his own people did not recognise their own Messiah.

For Paul it was a tragedy. At the beginning of the passage we heard read, Paul analysed what was going wrong in the following way.

For I can testify about them (Israelites) that they are zealous for God, but their zeal is not based on knowledge. Since they did not know the righteousness of God and sought to establish their own, they did not submit to God's righteousness.

Paul testifies that Israelites are zealous for God – but they have not understood what God requires of them. Their zeal is not based on knowledge. What God requires of them is that they 'submit to God's righteousness'. Instead they sought to construct their own righteousness. They wanted to do it by their own efforts.

Many pages have been written on what is meant by 'God's righteousness' or 'the righteousness of God.' For Paul, its main expression was in 'Christ crucified'. About his preaching, Paul wrote to the church in Corinth, 'I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified.'

Israelites found this an offence and a 'stumbling block' – that the ultimate expression of God's nature and righteousness was a man dying on a cross. For a people that wanted to establish their own righteousness, how could the crucified Christ be the pattern of their calling?

As Paul wrote, Israel 'did not submit to God's righteousness.' Instead they, and we, are called to "declare with our mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in our heart that God raised him from the dead..."

Submission is at the centre of these words. To believe in our heart rather than by the effort of our mind is to acknowledge that faith and salvation come from what God does within us and what God does for us - not what we do ourselves. To declare 'Jesus is Lord' is to say that we are not Lord of our own lives.

In his letter to the Romans, almost every time Paul talks about Jesus he refers to him as Lord Jesus, or Jesus Christ, or Lord Jesus Christ, or something similar. Only twice does he refer to him as Jesus without attaching the title Lord or Christ. And of course, 'Christ' is the title of the risen Jesus exalted to glory — thereby including the lordship of Jesus. For Paul, Jesus is the risen exalted Christ. He is Lord. Our proper place is to submit to him as our Lord.

I recently bought a new commentary on Romans. The commentary has 1027 pages. This is much longer than the actual Book of Romans which takes up only 15 pages in my Bible. This means that on average there are 68 pages of commentary for every page of the Bible. I must admit I'm really enjoying my new commentary. This may say I'm a theology nerd as well as a physics nerd.

What it also says is that Paul's letter to the Romans is a very complicated book. And the reason why it's so complicated is that in it Paul tries to express the inexpressible. Even Paul sometimes throws his hands in the air with frustration and amazement. In the next chapter, he cries out,

'Oh the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God.'

The truth is that the righteousness of God is far more difficult to understand than any earthly knowledge – including quantum physics and astrophysics. At the same time it is far easier. God asks us to live his mysteries not understand them. And that is a call and an invitation to every one of us.

Philosophy and theology can actually be a barrier. Paul writes elsewhere,

'Where is the wise person? Where is the philosopher of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world?'

To that I say Amen.

Paul says that two things are required – that we believe with our hearts and declare with our lips. These are not hard things. God invites us all to the heavenly celebration by the grace of Christ Jesus who is our Lord and Saviour.
