Reflection/Children's Talk

Welkom! Bienvenue! Wilkommen! Wamkelekile! Bienvenidos!

These were just a small selection of the words on the poster that greeted me when I arrived at a building for a meeting recently. These words all mean the same, but in different languages – and the English translation was on the poster too – WELCOME!

Printed in bright colours, this poster displayed the word "WELCOME" in over 100 different languages; the intention was that anyone who walked into that place would know that they

were welcome. The word Welcome is so important that apparently when people learn a new language, it's one of the first words they learn – alongside please and thank you! `And welcome is important in the church as well. In one of the churches in the Circuit there is some bunting hanging in the foyer saying Welcome. When the sun shines, the outline of the letters is projected onto the floor – as you walk in there is a sun-powered welcome mat to greet you! But how do we live out that welcome! Wherever we are its no good having welcome signs, if people come in and are ignored! Its no good having welcome signs, if we only make people welcome who agree with us or have to change to 'fit in'. It's no good having welcome signs if we make people feel in some way less valued or different.

If we want a pattern, a blueprint or a model for what welcome looks like then we need look no further than Jesus. Jesus didn't turn people away even when other people thought he should. What does the word 'Welcome' mean to you as a disciple of Jesus and how can you show his love in the welcome you give to others wherever you are?

Reading: Mark 9: 30-37

Sermon

Some years ago now I ran (I use the term loosely), my first and only half-marathon in Brighton. I've got the medal to prove it! I was reminded of this while watching footage of the Great North Run which took place recently – advertised as the World's biggest halfmarathon with over 50000 competitors. I remember standing in the crowds at the Brighton Half Marathon ready to go – thousands of us, all running for different reasons, all unique but, in our diversity brought together by a common aim – to run together, to journey together.

It was the same with the disciples to whom Jesus is speaking in our reading from Mark's Gospel. They were a diverse group of people; some fishermen, a tax collector, some whose professions we don't know but they were likely tradesmen of some kind. What brought them together was their common calling – their welcome from Jesus in the form of the words 'Follow me'. Without that, some of their paths may never have crossed.

And as well as their paths crossing, sometimes their words did too. We can sometimes fall into the trap of a very rose-tinted spectacles view of Jesus travelling with the disciples in a permanent atmosphere of peace and harmony. So it's quite arresting to the senses when we discover in our reading today that as they have travelled to Capernaum, perhaps to the house of Simon Peter and Andrew, they have been arguing. Jesus knows they have been arguing – and he knows what they have been arguing about. As they have been walking along the road, they've been arguing about who among them is the greatest. Jesus knows that but he wants to hear it from them. The disciples cannot bring themselves to respond in words, but their silence speaks volumes. They are ashamed – they realise that the content of their conversation was not appropriate.

Jesus speaks into the silence with a sentence, that as so often when Jesus speaks, overturns 'usual' practices and conventions. In a culture where someone's status in society had a marked impact on their life financially, socially and in many other ways, Jesus' words speak of kingdom values – "Anyone who wants to be first must be the very last, and the servant of all."

I often wonder when I think of the disciples about whether they spent quite a lot of their time with Jesus with their lower jaws on the floor – open mouthed at what taking his words seriously would mean. If their jaws have made it even half-way to the floor at this point then they will get lower – for Jesus speaks again. As he holds a child in his arms he says "Whoever welcomes one of these little children in my name welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me does not welcome me but the one who sent me"

Perhaps to us, the idea of welcoming children doesn't seem very radical. But in the culture and context into which Jesus was speaking it most certainly did. Some of us may have heard the phrase years ago 'Children are to be seen and not heard' but for those to whom Jesus was speaking children were not to be seen either. Children were "socially invisible", of no consequence– and yet Jesus states that whoever welcomes a child in his name, welcomes Him.

"Well", we might say "things are different now" ...but are they really? I shudder when I hear the children and young people in our congregations referred to as 'the church of tomorrow' when they are critical, valued and loved by God as active participants in the church of today. How do we ensure that valuing? And what if we widen our view of children to be a non-aged-based view. Each one of us is a child of God. But do we believe that some are greater than others or even, that we are greater than others?

When I ran that half-marathon 9 years ago, I certainly wasn't first! When I got my medal, I was pleased but over time I've reflected much more not no what it says on the medal, but what it says on the ribbon – "Finisher". In God's economy all are precious, all are loved, all are welcomed. Let us ensure that's the case for all who God places to run and walk alongside us in the journey of life. Let us encourage one another. As the author of the letter to the Hebrews writes "And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith". To Him be the praise and the glory.
