Reading, Colossians 1:9b-20

[Note on the reading. This is one of Paul's last letters probably written from Rome not long before his execution. After years preaching the gospel across the Empire, he now writes a letter to a church he has never visited. Paul includes a 'heads-up' reflection on who Jesus is, risen and glorified, and its meaning for believers.]

We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives, ¹⁰ so that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, ¹¹ being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, ¹² and giving joyful thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of his holy people in the kingdom of light. ¹³ For has rescued us from the dominion of darkness and brought us into the kingdom of the Son he loves, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

¹⁵ The Son is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation. ¹⁶ For in him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷ He is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ And he is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning and the firstborn from among the dead, so that in everything he might have the supremacy. ¹⁹ For God was pleased to have all his fullness dwell in him, ²⁰ and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether things on earth or things in heaven, by making peace through his blood, shed on the cross.

Sermon: Who do you think you are?

There's a programme on BBC called 'Who do you think you are?' Each episode traces back the heritage of a celebrity. It goes back many generations and usually finds a surprise - a heart-breaking experience or an unexpected connection to somebody famous. There was the case of somebody from apparently humble origins who is descended from a mediaeval king. I can't remember who it was off the top of my head.

There are other similar programmes. One uses DNA to discover origins and connect to unknown relations. Another programme traces the history of a particular house and its inhabitants since it was built.

Our background matters to us. Going back a few generations, my family on both sides worked the land in Lincolnshire. They were remarkably unremarkable, but they have some interesting names. On my mother's side there was one called Massingberd – that was his first name - Osbourne.

If somebody asks us who we are, what defines who we are, what is our identity, what do we say? Place of up-bringing and family history are part of it. Today's reading from Colossians is Paul telling us who we are. Paul writes of our family history in a different sense in which God is our Father, Jesus is his Son and we are adopted into the family as joint heirs with Jesus. It forms our identity just as much as our earthly family. Let us see what Paul tells us of who we are.

Most of what I read is non-fiction. Instead of beginning at the beginning and ending at the end, occasionally I find it more helpful to read the last chapter first and then work my way backwards through the book. Today's reading works well if read backwards since its beginning follows as a consequence of its end.

The last few verses give an extraordinary picture of Jesus as the glorified Lord. Jesus was not just a man who walked the roads of Galillee. He was there at the beginning of time. All things were created through him. In him all things hold together. In him all things will be reconciled to God. And even as a man in Galillee all fullness of God dwelt in him. This was Paul reflecting on Jesus at the end of his life. Colossians was one of the last letters he wrote. Over the course of three decades following Jesus he had learnt that Jesus was much more than an ordinary man, although he was at the same time just that — born of a human mother like any other human being with the same desires and impulses and physical limitations that we all have. I will not pretend to understand this, but that doesn't stop it being true.

Tracing Paul's argument backwards in the preceding verses, Paul writes of our identity in relationship to Jesus as Christ. Paul writes not of each of us individually but collectively as the Church – not even as a collection of individual churches in Reading or Basingstoke or places in between. We are the Church with a capital 'C' spread across space and time as a cosmological and eternal entity. The Church is the Body of Christ and within the Body, Jesus is its Head.

Tracing back the argument towards the beginning of the reading, Paul speaks of us individually as members of the Body. Paul uses the language of family. He writes of God the Father, Jesus as the Son, and ourselves as co-inheritors of what the Father bequeaths to the Son. As Paul writes elsewhere we are adopted as children of God. In Roman law, adopted children have the same rights as naturally born children. Jesus is the first-born and we share in the inheritance that belongs to Jesus. Paul write here that our identity as children of God is granted through the cross which brings redemption and forgiveness of sins. Once again, I do not pretend to understand, but it still a truth that we can hold on to. This is our identity, that we are members of a family in which God is Father and Jesus has the special place of being the first-born.

We have now arrived back at the beginning of the reading. Paul's first sentence in the reading is more easily understood because it relates to life as we experience it. The sentence is long and can be split into two parts. Its second half is a list of the benefits and responsibilities of our identity as God's children. In other words, it follows from what comes later in the passage. It comes in prayer form. Paul's prayer is that the Christians in Colossae may

live a life worthy of the Lord and please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, ¹¹ being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, ¹² and giving joyful thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of his holy people in the kingdom of light.

And now back to the first half of the first sentence where Paul prays for the Colossians:

We continually ask God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all the wisdom and understanding that the Spirit gives...

This is how it becomes a reality that we are the Body of Christ the Son and co-inheritors of the promises of God the Father. It is the Spirit who makes it real to us and in us. The Spirit brings wisdom and understanding which fills us with knowledge of God's will that we may live lives worthy of the Lord.

Who do you think you are? In this passage, Paul tells us who we are. Having read the passage backwards, now let us read it forwards.

Paul starts with the Spirit working in us to change us as we grow in wisdom, knowledge and understanding. He then sets out how our growth in the Spirit is driven by our identity as members of God's family - and then in turn how our identity is founded on the identity of Jesus Christ in whom all things were created, all things hold together, and in whom all things will be reconciled. This is who Jesus Christ is. And as a consequence, and by grace, it is how God makes us who we are.
