RECORDED: STORY OF JONAH

You already know this but the bible is made up of 39 separate books in the Old Testament and 27 in the New Testament. They are all written in different styles, some are history, some prophesy, poetry/psalms, some letters, some gospels... and we read them with the understanding of what style they are written in. That is to say that you wouldn't read a letter and assume it is history. Or read a prophecy and accept it as historical fact. Prophecy is the making known of the will of God through authorised and inspired individuals.

Now the lectionary for today is from the book of Jonah, which I find rather apt, as I feel that God has been placing the story of Jonah before me constantly over the last 6 months, and here it is again. So here is a recap for you of the 4 chapters of Jonah, God's Prophet.

The word of the Lord came to Jonah "Go to the great city of Nineveh and preach against it because its wickedness has come up before me". But Jonah thought: 'What, go to that Gentile, multi-cultural city and be ridiculed at best or put my life at risk at worse?! No fear'. And Jonah went in the opposite direction, bought a ticket and sailed for Tarsish 'to flee from the Lord'. Then the Lord sent a great wind and such a violent storm arose that the ship threatened to break up. All the crew of the ship – non-Israelites – cried out to their own Gods to be saved but Jonah finally acknowledged that it was the God of Israel who was angry with him and that the captain and crew should throw him overboard to calm the storm, to sacrifice him to save everybody else.

The ship's crew sacrificed Jonah to the Lord of Israel and made vows to that God, and threw Jonah overboard. But the Lord provided a great fish to swallow Jonah... one great gulp and there he was, alive in

the dark belly, bobbing about amongst octopus tentacles, the odd fish bone, and praying like he'd never prayed before.

And after 3 days the Lord commanded the fish to vomit Jonah onto dry land. And my word didn't he scurry off to Nineveh warning them of God's destruction if they didn't change their ways.... So they did. These Gentiles repented and turned to God. Which of course made Jonah greatly displeased and angry, so he figuratively stamped his foot in what seems quite a childish way – but I suspect we have all done it as adults – and Jonah made a shelter for himself to sit in... to sulk it seems; to make his point to God, effectively saying he wasn't going to do anything else as God's prophet because God double crossed him, didn't play fair. And God provided a vine to grow round it and shield him from the sun and wind ... but only for a little while, cos God soon sent a worm to eat the vine and Jonah was furious, saying "I am angry enough to die"

And there we will leave Jonah, by the side of the road where he has sat for millennia.

From the Old Testament, to the New. We hear how Jesus is being verbally attacked, if that is not too strong a phrase, by the Pharisees and teachers of the law, who address him not as "Lord" – which is how his disciples address him, but just as "teacher" Almost the equivalent of 'hey you'.

Matthew 12: 38 – 42 ³⁸ Then some of the Pharisees and teachers of the law said to him, "Teacher, we want to see a sign from you."³⁹ He answered, "A wicked and adulterous generation asks for a sign! But none will be given it except the sign of the prophet Jonah. ⁴⁰ For as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of a huge fish, so the Son of Man will be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth. ⁴¹ The men of Nineveh will stand up at the judgment with this generation and condemn it; for they repented at the preaching of Jonah, and now something greater than Jonah is here. ⁴² The Queen of the South will rise at the judgment with this generation and condemn it; for she came from the ends of the earth to listen to Solomon's wisdom, and now something greater than Solomon is here.

RECORDED SERMON

The scribes and Pharisees ask him for a sign to prove His authority. But Jesus answers that "no sign will be given except the sign of the prophet Jonah." (This is also recorded in Luke's gospel chapter 11). The gospels were written after the resurrection, so the writers know that Jesus will indeed – as he predicts - be 3

'in the heart of the earth' for 3 days. This for the gospel writers is all they need to connect Jesus with Jonah. Jonah sacrificed to save the gentile sailors. Jesus the far greater sacrifice for all

It is interesting how sometimes the stories we think are for children go much deeper. Just think...

- God tells Jonah to send a warning to the people of Nineveh. Jesus comes as a warning to all generations.
- Jonah does not do as God commands but sails in the opposite direction. Jesus obeys God.
- Jonah's words to the people of Nineveh save them through their repentance, Jesus words save us.
- Jonah's preaching to the Ninevites resulted in their repentance. But Jesus' words and miracles have
 no effect upon the scribes and Pharisees. Jesus warns them that even though they are the elite
 Jews they are not automatically within God's favour. They need to stop trying to trick Jesus and
 listen. Jesus tells them that even the Queen of Sheba travelled miles to listen to the wisdom of
 Solomon, and here is the son of man, one greater than Solomon or Jonah.

There is a straight line through the gospels from this point that leads to the moment when Jesus weeps over Jerusalem because, unlike Nineveh it has ignored the warnings, refused the way of peace, and we know that the story of Jesus continues to the crucifixion and resurrection and onwards.

But where is the story of Jonah left? Oh yes... Jonah is still sitting, moping, furious by the side of the road. His story has frozen in time. Some stories do that; freeze frame and ask the reader or viewer: what will happen next. Charles Dickens used to do this writing in Household Words, ending on a metaphorical cliff hanger so that the next edition would be bought to see what happened next. Writers of tv Soaps do it. But we never know with Jonah.

How would we like it to end? What would we like the rest of Jonah's story to say? (pause)

Can we associate with how Jonah was feeling... have we felt like that – really angry about the way others have benefitted undeservedly (as we perceive it?).

Imagining Jonah sitting by the side of the road, angry, indignant with how God has forgiven the people that Jonah thinks are undeserving, we see human nature not at its worst but at what is probably quite a common state. We know perhaps how he feels!

Let us not leave this sermon concentrating on Jonah. Let us leave concentrating on God. Where was God at this point in Jonah's life? God has sent the worm to destroy the shade and increased the heat of the situation, as if Jonah wasn't hot and bothered enough already. Was God being unkind? Surely not. Teaching him a lesson? Perhaps. I think God was simply waiting......

Prayer of intercession

Drawn to worship by God let us bring to God our concerns. There is a response to: "Thy Kingdom come, **Thy will be done**"
