We're towards the end of the School holidays.

When those holidays began, travelling was a real problem -queues of traffic towards Dover with waits of up to 6 hours in the car; or trains not running; or great hold ups at airports.

Journeys can be full of difficulties, frustrations and hold-ups.

"Are we nearly there?" comes a voice at the back of the car and the answer may be, "Not for a very long time yet".

Journeys can be really boring, things to be survived, not enjoyed.

Boring, frustrating, difficult-yes, sometimes- but journeys can also be incredibly exciting! Your first time on an aeroplane, in a helicopter, on board a ship, your first time in a different country or in a place you've never been to before.

Some of the most exciting books and films are ones where the main characters are on a journey somewhere, -Indiana Jones searching for hidden treasure, Star Trek exploring the unknown; or real-life adventures - people who have explored new continents, the team that first climbed Everest.

Everyone who follows Jesus is on a journey.

Sometimes it can be hard going and you may feel you want to turn back and give up.

There are many, many Biblical journeys - Here are some -You may think of many more -

Abraham sets out in faith-Genesis 12:1-5a

Now the LORD said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. ² I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. ³ I will bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed." [a]⁴ So Abram went, as the LORD had told him, and Lot went with him. Abram was seventy-five years old when he departed from Haran. ⁵ Abram took his wife

Sarai and his brother's son Lot and all the possessions that they had gathered and the persons whom they had acquired in Haran, and they set forth to go to the land of Canaan.

The Israelites escape from Egypt-

Exodus 14:15b-22

¹⁵ Then the LORD said to Moses, "Tell the Israelites to move on. ¹⁶ Raise your staff and stretch out your hand over the sea to divide the water so that the Israelites can go through the sea on dry ground. ¹⁷ I will harden the hearts of the Egyptians so that they will go in after them. And I will gain glory through Pharaoh and all his army, through his chariots and his horsemen. ¹⁸ The Egyptians will know that I am the LORD when I gain glory through Pharaoh, his chariots and his horsemen."

¹⁹ Then the angel of God, who had been traveling in front of Israel's army, withdrew and went behind them. The pillar of cloud also moved from in front and stood behind them, ²⁰ coming between the armies of Egypt and Israel. Throughout the night the cloud brought darkness to the one side and light to the other side; so neither went near the other all night long. ²¹ Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and all that night the LORD drove the sea back with a strong east wind and turned it into dry land. The waters were divided, ²² and the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their right and on their left.

The Israelites return from exile-Isaiah 48:20

Go out from Babylon; flee from Chaldea; declare this with a shout of joy; proclaim it; send it forth to the end of the earth; say, "The LORD has redeemed his servant Jacob!"

Journeys around the birth of Jesus-Matthew 2:1-2

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, magi^[a] from the east came to Jerusalem, ² asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star in the east^[b] and have come to pay him homage."

Jesus in the wilderness-Mark 1:12-13

And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. ¹³ He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

Jesus sets out for Jerusalem-Luke 9:51

When the days drew near for him to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem.

Jesus enters Jerusalem-Luke 19:35-38

They brought the donkey to Jesus, and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶ As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. ³⁷ Now as he was approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, ³⁸ saying, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!

Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!"

Many journeys of the early Christians-

Acts 8: 1b, 4

That day a severe persecution began against the church in Jerusalem, and all except the apostles were scattered throughout the countryside of Judea and Samaria. ²⁴ Now those who were scattered went from place to place, proclaiming the word.

Sermon "Journey of Faith"

Many journeys are about searching for something, discovering something, exploring somewhere-and so are faith journeys-seeking for truth, discovering strength, exploring love.

And the more we discover the more we keep on searching.

One of my favourite prayers is by Catherine of Siena-"Eternal Trinity, you are a deep sea, in which the more we seek the more we find, and the more we find the more we seek".

One journey of discovery continually leads to another.

The journey of faith takes us in at least 3 different directions-the journey inwards, the journey upwards and the journey outwards.

The journey inwards helps us to discover our identity, our purpose in life at the stage we have now reached. Jesus at his baptism became aware of how immensely he was valued and affirmed. In his wilderness journey straight afterwards he was conscious of being tempted and tested as he tried to work out the repercussions of what he had received at his baptism.

The wilderness was a suitable place for him to explore his inner journey. Solitude and even emptiness can help us in that same exploration.

Solitude and emptiness can lead us into wonderful times of peace and spaciousness.

They can also lead us into searching and challenging times which can be so uncomfortable that we may try to avoid such moments through constant activity, noise and distraction.

The journey inwards may demand of us the brutal honesty of confronting truth about ourselves.

It is a place of losing and finding-losing compulsion, anger and greed and other undesirable traits of character and finding in their place the gentle, healing power that helps to transform our lives and to give us fresh direction.

If the journey inwards is inevitably centred upon ourselves in self discovery so the journey upwards is centred upon God and the discovery of God's being.

The journey upwards was of great importance to Jesus throughout his life.

There were many times when he would spend time in prayer.

His companionship beside us helps us to make the journey upwards.

Like climbers attached to each other by ropes we can choose to let ourselves be attached to Jesus and him to guide and lead us into the higher reaches of the spirit and towards staggering new views of life.

Developing our prayer life and participating in worship can help us move along the journey upwards.

The journey inwards concentrates on us; the journey upwards concentrates on God; and the journey outwards brings us in contact with other people.

It may specially draw us towards the people who are on the same journey.

The companions on our road may well be people from our own Church or from neighbouring churches.

They may be people who belong to our own family or close circle of friends.

They may even be people we have not known before, possibly people of another faith or people of no faith.

They may be colleagues at work, our near neighbours, people we come across in our local community.

They may be people we only meet once in our lives or those we encounter with frequency.

In meeting them, through respectful listening, there may be a great deal for us to learn,

And who knows what we may be able to give ourselves?

Who knows what a positive contribution we may be able to make?

Who knows where the journey outwards may take us in an ever-extending commitment to social justice?

The journey outwards encourages us to share insights, to bear the burdens of others and to let them bear ours.

Through the companionship of others we may receive the precious gift of friendship and learn more of what it means to love and to be loved.

So where are you on these various journeys?

On your inward journey are you making space for yourself?

On your upward journey are you making space for God?

And on your outward journey are you making space for others?

Make space to reflect; recognise God's presence with you; share with your fellow travellers.

And may God bless us and bless others through us on all our journeys.

We pray for all who set out on hazardous journeys, including people fleeing for safety from wars and poverty and oppression.

We think of people on journeys they have not chosen for themselves, including those who are trafficked in present day slavery.
