Reading Mark 8 v 27 – end of the chapter

Sermon

This story marks a turning point in the gospel. The New Testament training book for Local Preachers when I was 'On Trial' was by Morna Hooker and it was she who first drew my attention to the change of focus that occurs with this passage.

Jesus and his disciples are walking together near the villages around Caesera Phillippi. Walking is a good time to talk. Being alongside someone and not facing them allows for deep conversation. Jesus asks his disciples 'who do people say that I am?'. I imagine that when Jesus was speaking to the crowds his disciples were mingling and mixing, overhearing snatched conversations. They're catching the comments of those in the crowd. So, to Jesus' question the disciples respond with what they're hearing 'on the streets.' So, I wonder if Jesus were to ask us 'who do people say that I am?' what we would say. What are people 'on the streets' saying about Jesus?

Pause for a moment and think – what are people saying about Jesus? The people you know, perhaps family members, friends you have coffee with - do they say anything at all about him? Have we asked? I suspect for many people Jesus doesn't even cross their consciousness. Is that a fair assessment? Maybe there is work for us to do to ask folk, - family members, friends, work colleagues. It might lead to an interesting conversation and you, and I would be better informed and so would our mission.

'To be or not to be?' according to Shakespeare's Hamlet is supposed to be 'the question'!! I beg to differ with the great bard. The second question Jesus asks in this passage is <u>the</u> question. After the replies to the general question Jesus gets personal. He asks the disciples 'who do you say that I am?' Peter jumps straight in with his inspired answer. I wonder if the other disciples breathe a sigh of relief that they don't have to reveal their hand! What's your answer to this question Jesus asks? Please don't rush on to read any more until you've answered the question Jesus poses. It doesn't have to be set words like 'Messiah' or 'Saviour'. What words describe who Jesus is to you? Having a clearer idea of your answer will help in conversations which result from asking others the first question.

In the Bible story there's some toing and froing between Jesus and Peter before Jesus speaks not just to the disciples but to the crowd as well (v34). I believe Jesus is saying your answer to who I am requires more than just a verbal answer. The consequence of what you answer is discipleship. If we believe Jesus to be the one who we have just described. For me that is in terms of 'Son of God', 'the one who offers life in all its fullness' 'purpose giver' then I/we can't leave it at that we must listen and respond to what Jesus says next:

'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me.'

I've often thought of those 3 phrases as separate. As I was preparing for this sermon, I've come to see them as different facets of the same thing – denying oneself, taking up of one's cross and following Jesus. These 3 aspects – self-denial, cross bearing and following are not immediately brilliant selling points. A marketing expert would be suggesting more attractive options. In the biography of John Wesley, I'm reading, Wesley was struggling with the concept he'd been reading in Thomas a Kempis' 'The Imitation of Christ'. In this book, which became precious to Wesley, a Kempis was saying Christians would find life in a 'vale of tears'. Christians could look forward to being miserable!! Is that what Jesus is saying here 'being a disciple is a miserable existence marked by suffering and no joy?'!!! Wesley renounced the notion, as should we.

'Denying oneself' is not about losing one's identity. Far from it. It is about bringing everything about ourselves under the influence and into the use of Christ. Bringing skills, personality and experience into the service of the kingdom. What is denied is the self-focus, the idea that life revolves around us. Self-focus is denied in favour of the needs of kingdom and in the service of Christ. To do this daily is to take up one's cross. For taking up one's cross is to choose the way of Jesus, the way of justice, the way of loving God and our neighbour, the pattern of resisting everything and everyone which works counter to God's purposes. It's a daily choice which lies before those of us who have recognised who Jesus is. In making that daily choice we are following Jesus, who made those choices before us. Jesus explains that it is making these choices that we gain life. To do anything otherwise results in loss of life and soul. Jesus came to bring life in all its fulness, and that life is found in him and in service of the kingdom.
