Sermon

DOES THE KINGDOM OF GOD OFFER EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR ALL?

Until the time when our Lord Jesus came to the scene, the opportunities to enter into God's Kingdom were very limited. If you were a gentile or a tax collector, you were labelled a sinner and not qualified to enter the Kingdom of God. The grace through Abraham was limited and the laws were stiff. Gentiles had their own gods and the Kingdom of God was reserved for a few.

At the inaugural address of our Lord Jesus in Nazareth, his emphasis was to open the Kingdom and send the message of good news to include those on the fringes of society and those who had fallen through the cracks and declare the year of favour to encompass all. This statement was unusual and was received with shock. In the sermon of the mount when he elaborated on the Kingdom values, he stressed again and again that equal opportunities have been given to all to come into the Kingdom of God.

What intrigues me most is how he also chose the people who were to be his disciples. His followers felt they were unworthy and many of them were labelled as sinners.

Matthew was chosen, when Jesus was fully aware that he was a tax collector – a group of Jewish people who collected taxes from Jewish people for the occupying Roman authorities. It was not the collection of taxes that made them sinners but the way they inflated the taxes, squeezed poor and the widows of every denarii that they could get in order to enrich themselves. John the Baptist had warned them of such bad practices that could hinder them from the Kingdom of God. The Pharisees labelled every tax collector a sinner. So why did Jesus call Matthew to be his disciple and later called Zacchaeus another tax collector as well? Both Matthew and Zacchaeus and for that matter Mary Magdalene - all knew that they were excluded from God's Kingdom because of their profession but when they were offered the opportunities, Matthew immediately closed his tax booth and followed Jesus. As for Zacchaeus, he decided to refund his exploits to

the exploited. Mary gave the rest of her life to serve our Lord. These people probably realized that <u>the power</u> <u>behind the calling was stronger than the power of sin that held them back</u> and they seized the opportunity.

Jesus was challenged by the Pharisees for mingling with tax collectors and Jesus defended his position that the Kingdom of God is open to all and he has come specifically to seek those who are lost. The Pharisees completely disagreed with Jesus on this issue.

Judas chosen by our Lord was a thief who could not repent for all the opportunities that were given to him. The problem was not the Kingdom, the problem was Judas himself, because another thief in a brief moment on the cross made a dash for it and seized the opportunity to enter the Kingdom of God and he did.

On the contrary, the call of Peter was different. Fishermen were not labelled as sinners in the Jewish society, but why did Peter feel unqualified to respond to the call to become part of the fishers of men? Why did he feel that he was a sinner and did not qualify to work for God's Kingdom? **Sin had made Peter feel unworthy to respond.** Peter did not realize that the power behind the calling was stronger than the force of sin that was holding him back. And this was the principle behind the invitation by Jesus - that Nobody should feel held back by their sins.

The dominance of sin has created a huge problem for God but they love their creation and <u>they have</u> <u>dedicated themselves to a healing process to restore us.</u> They are fully aware that YOU CANNOT LOVE WITHOUT GIVING PART OF YOURSELF and you cannot love without paying a price. <u>Love comes at a</u> <u>cost and there is no exception for God as well</u>. They have loved us not because we are loveable but because love is essential to the nature of God and the object of their love is the world they have created. God so loved the world he gave his only begotten Son for us. Jesus demonstrated this love in his sermons, preaching, teaching, his calling and his death on the cross for us.

Paul puts it this way: that God is reconciling the world to himself in Christ by not counting people's sins against them. Jesus is at the crossroad of our lives and calling sinners to turn back from the years of wasted life. We who were once sinners are called to be part of the reconciliation process.

Non-Christians often find sin holding them back, but the Holy Spirit who convicts us of sin also seeks to set us free from it. May God make each one of us a channel of his grace and use us to call others in this process of reconciliation. The world has been through a lot recently, but God's love for us will restore us through his son our Lord Jesus.
