Sermon

Our sermon is about a challenge to the church. It was inspired the call to worship, which is from a card a minister got me many years ago to mark me going to University. It was about being a light unto others and through difficult times and challenging times I remember that card and I especially remember it because I personally and theologically did not agree with the minister at that time. I was still very very law focused. I decided to focus on our differences and not what united us and that's what I want to talk about. When I, we, recently had the passage from Romans 'Do not conform yourself to this world', it reminded me of something I wanted to preach on, and this is the divisions of the church.

There are two responses to divisions in the church. One is to deny there are any, which is ridiculous, and the other is to play into them. But these divisions are a reflection of the world outside. The various camps- traditionalists, the modernists, the liberals, the conservatives, they all oppose something in the world outside though they differ on what it is they dislike and they all use God to try and support their side and they ignore passages they don't like and they don't listen to challenges in scripture that they don't want to. They paint the picture of Christianity that is not true. I will say that the conservatives tend to paint a picture of God who has no mercy, and the liberals, a God who never says no. Both of these are an empty vision of God. We may not like it, but God occasionally has laws that we have to abide by, and we may find it difficult but God loves people that we don't always find it easy to love.

This is the challenge of God. So how do we overcome this? The key can be found in verses 9 to 13 are equally important. Love must be sincere; hate what is evil; cling to what is good; be devoted to one another in love; honour one another above yourselves. And I'm afraid when we take the sectarian 'teams' that we are not doing this. We fall into the patterns of the world. We hate one another because someone is high church, someone else is low church. We literally schism the church over whether allowing to allow same sex marriage or divorce or one of a million things that we decide are important. But if you look at the history the church, these divisions often pass. They are of the age. I'm afraid the divisions of the church currently are reflection of the world outside and not of the love of God. And the reason I think this links in with the call to worship, is that the call to worship is an image of the church as it can be, if it actually allowed God to work at it on it in its heart.

We are called to be a light unto the world. 'Let your light shine before others that they may see your good deeds and glorify the Father', but what do people see when they look at the church? Judgmental, overly tolerant: they see this schizophrenic institution, at war with each other, echoing the wider cultural wars. I'm not saying division hasn't been always part of church history. You only have to read the book of Acts to see that there were differing views on things. On whether to allow gentiles to convert with or without circumcision, whether the Greeks were being treated as fairly as the Roman citizens. There are all these cultural divisions but the reason the church prospered in those times was because it followed the Holy Spirit even through persecution, even through hate and intolerance. It showed the Romans a different way of being: a radical and revolutionary way of being.

Not at each other's throats but united in Christ. We all know that familiar passage in Christ there is no Jew nor Gentile, no slave or free. There is no liberal, there is no conservative, there is no modernist, there is no traditional. We have a choice who to follow in this world. God gives us that choice. We can follow these modern trends and the leaders who seek power through our separation or we can show the world a united face of mercy and forgiveness. A shine city of people trying to live their best lives together in unity with an identity that is given to us through Christ? Our identity is of disciples, trying to follow Jesus as best we can. That identity requires sacrifice, and in here we are called to be a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, and each side will say 'Oh yes, of course I'm holy and pleasing to God but the lot aren't.' And every other side will say well I'm not patterning myself according to the world, the others are though. While the liberals, yes, they don't pattern themselves economically, but they pattern themselves according to the modern morals of this world. The Conservatives yes they don't do morally, but they often do economically and certainly show a tendency toward putting law above mercy.

The patterns of this world is how we define ourselves. Even if we define ourselves against them, that's allowing them to define us in a way. We aren't being a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, we aren't giving ourselves to God, we aren't allowing him to change us, and the whole gospel is about this transformation from living to dead. This transformation, lost to found, of a world in need of Jesus who is God made flesh and came into that world and died to change it, to allow others to change through that process of death and rebirth.

A new Kingdom came when Jesus died. The Kingdom of God established its first foot hold and this passage from Matthew talked about what the Kingdom of God should look like to those who look at it. A light to the world and beacon to lost. Not divided. Not unthinking. Not unblinking. When scripture says we should be of one mind, that mind should be Jesus. It doesn't mean we have to agree with one another. It doesn't mean we have to be single minded zombies. When it talks about sheep it doesn't mean we all have to be in one mind in some sort of controlled flock. God gives us free thought. His mercy is big enough for a Church of difference; a church that disagrees but a church still remembers that God is a centre of everything it does. That God is its definition; that God's mission of forgiveness, of redemption, of new life, that God's power to change us and the church into what He wants it to be, is still ongoing.

So I ask you brothers and sisters, are sectarian differences so important that in this time of crisis, and this is what we are living through, a time of crisis, that we cannot put them aside? The world is waiting, waiting for someone to show in a different way of being. I recently saw the presidential debates. Yes I make myself go through these things! If the world continues this partisan, crazy way, it will never recover. The world is broken are the only cure is Jesus. We have to lead this change. We have to allow the Holy Spirit into our hearts and into our churches to transform

us. We have to reject the world and its call. We have to make ourselves- no, no- we have to allow the Holy Spirit to make ourselves a living sacrifice. Not tied to the things of this world, not tied to our past, our histories, not tied to our divisions or the divisions of the world outside but tied through God in love. And by this and by the work of the Holy Spirit we will be transformed. That call from Matthew 'You are light to the world. A town built upon a hill cannot be hidden. A lamp on a lampstand gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way let your light shine before others that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven.'

This is what the church can be transformed into. In this age of challenge and division through unity, and that's the word scripture uses, unity with Christ, unity of the Holy Spirit, we have unity with God. So be transformed. Die to this world's divisions. Become citizens of the Kingdom of Heaven. A light unto the nations. A light that dark cannot overcome. In the same way let your light shine before others that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven. Amen
