Invitation to Reflection

Social Distance like a Wesley

Avoid all the people you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, as long as ever you can

I don't know how athletic you were at school. But my heart always broke for the last person picked for a team during PE. To be the child who was so bad at rounders, or netball, or football that they might as well not bring clothes to do PE in at all, because it is basically going to be another massive embarrassment in your young life. No-one likes being the odd one out, or the least important person in a crowd. That must be even worse, when your brother is the most famous person in their field that lived in the whole century, and you were basically his sidekick.

Today we worship slightly differently to what we normally do. We will be responding to the very wise words of one Rev David Jenkins who once described our Methodist uniqueness as us being a people who "sing our theology." The Methodist Church in southern Africa, where I grew up and was trained as a minister, takes enormous pride in the fact that the Methodist movement was 'born in song'. Many of the most famous African language hymns in the region were written by Methodist missionaries and their local guides and interpreters. So much so, that they are still recorded today by secular and gospel artists alike. Most of whom know nothing of the history.

Today we pay homage to the works of the "lesser spotted singing Wesley" (Say that in your best David Attenborough voice). Charles Wesley's hymns contain something of a 'Methodist creed' and they teach us so much about our journey with Jesus. They tell us of what we believe, how we should behave, and what Jesus has done for, is doing in, and is doing through us. So, as we worship today we will delve into the message of the book of Romans, the lyrics of hymns written by Charles Wesley, and you are invited to listen out for what God is inviting you to, how you need to respond – whatever stage of your journey with Jesus we find yourself on. This is what the early church called The Way, the path we walk with Jesus, even when we walk unaware.

Confessions

God who has created us in love and invited us into your family, we have not always lived lives which bring glory to you, or even to ourselves. Through our own deliberate fault we have done things of which we are not proud; we have failed to love our neighbour as you have loved us; we have even failed to love ourselves in the way you would expect of us; we have cause hurt, caused hunger, caused illness by our turning a blind eye on the need of others; we have left undone the task which you have called us to. Forgive us.

Lord of love and power, you have overcome sin and death, choosing to suffer to show God's great love for us. Many times, on the road, you spoke gracious words to sinners: "Your sins are forgiven!" May these words ring true in our ears this day. Jesus, visit us with your grace, create in us clean hearts which being open and receptive to God's invitation, we might live as the physical presence of your gracious love in the world. Amen

All people need to be saved...

Read Romans 3:9-20

We like to think that we are doing okay as people. We try to live ethical lives and we help people in need. We do good things. In fact, the United Kingdom is one of the most generous charity giving nations in the world. A 99-year-old World War Two veteran, Captain Tom Moore, raised 25 million Pounds for the NHS by walking sponsored laps of his back yard the other day. That takes some generous giving. But is charity enough. Is doing good things enough. The passage we read puts it like this "there is no one that is righteous, not even one." What we do cannot make us righteous, and yet we hold that God is at work in us, even before we are aware – always reaching out to us in love no matter how far away we are from God.

Read Romans 3:21-26

Read Romans 8:1-16

We live in a time where almost everything is uncertain. Of course, our current situations with lockdowns the world over to try and contain the pandemic creates its own uncertainty. But also, the way that many people's world views have developed over the last hundred years or so shuns any thought or possibility of certainty. But assurance and certainty are different things. To know that you are saved is not about certainty, that would be to take God's place in making decisions about forgiving us. And that sort of action would almost certainly mean we would not be forgiving a lot of people that God would be. Romans put it like this, "The Spirit testifies with our spirit that we are God's children." Assurance is holding on to that, you are God's beloved child.
