Call to Worship.

Reflection/Children's Address: Church Keep-Fit

I have to confess that before March 2020 I had never heard of Joe Wicks. I like to try and keep as fit as possible, and over the years have run (I use the term loosely) a half-marathon, joined a Zumba class and climbed a large mountain in Tanzania. I had never, however, entered the world of online workouts, the world that Joe Wicks inhabits with his YouTube channel, nor had I tuned into his TV programme.

In March 2020 Joe hit the headlines in a very positive way when he launched "PE with Joe" at the beginning of the first lockdown so that children having to stay at home rather than go to school could keep fit at home with parents, grandparents or carers. He did every school day until July and began them again at the start of this latest lockdown with a workout several times a week.

Keeping fit is of course important for us as individuals, but it is also important for us as a church. We need to do our exercises and we can do them by using a pattern that has been well-publicised in the church in recent years — looking up, looking down, looking in and looking out.

As individuals and as congregations we need to:

LOOK UP...to God, keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus, seeking God's will and purposes.

LOOK DOWN...to remain rooted – not planting our feet firmly so they are immovable but pulling through from our traditions, what is important and deepening in our relationship with Jesus.

LOOK IN...be prepared to reflect on our own relationship with Jesus and to encourage one another as we journey together.

LOOK OUT – to the world God has created, to serve others in God's church, our local community and care for God's world.

Let's keep this workout going, not just for lockdown but for all our lives!

Readings: Isaiah 6:1-8 -

Matthew 28: 16-20

Sermon -

I love walking. At the moment, with restrictions on travelling further, the paths local to us are very well trodden and familiar. Returning from a two hour walk with a friend some months ago, I remember her saying 'How do you remember all that without a map'. Her comment reminded me of the time that whilst my car was in for repair, I was driving a hire car. I found myself in an unfamiliar place, the car did not have a GPS (something I have become over-reliant on) and the map I would normally have as back-up in my own car, was

still there, in my own car, in the garage. I stopped to ask for directions — or I may still have been there now!

As churches in the Circuit, we will be doing lots of thinking about MAP's in the coming months. Through the Circuit Strategy, each church has been asked to produce a MAP – a Mission Action Plan. It sounds grand, but it's just a tool for helping us to think through what God is calling us to do, where and how. It's an opportunity for us to review what we are doing and even lay some things down either to focus deeper on others or to pick up new things we believe God is leading us to. Just as we need to be prepared to ask for directions even if we do have maps at our disposal for our travelling, so we need to be prepared to ask for directions with our Mission Action Planning – if our plans are not grounded and founded in prayer, they will flounder.

Mission Action Planning. The last two words of that phrase – Action and Planning are relatively easy to define. But today through our Scripture readings I'd like us to think about mission. Shelves of books have been written about mission but today I'd like us to explore who's mission, why mission, and what mission?

Firstly, then "Whose mission?" When we as a church talk about mission, it's critical, I believe that we remember who's mission it is. Mission, as it says on our Methodist Church website, "is about living out God's love in the world". At the centre of that 8-word phrase is GOD. In our Old Testament reading Isaiah has a vision. All is not well in Judah. From the second verse of the first chapter of Isaiah we are drawn to the fact that the people have rebelled against God. In the vision Isaiah finds himself in the Temple, in the Holy of Holies. As the vision continues, Isaiah knows that he is in the presence of God, and the heavenly council – the seraphim. He stands and cries out to God – recognising the rebellion of the nation and his own part within it – "Woe to me" he cries "I am ruined! For I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips". Isaiah receives God's forgiveness as one of the seraphim touches his lips with a live coal. It is at this point that God asks the heavenly council a question - "Who shall we send and who will go for us?". This isn't actually a question voiced directly to Isaiah – but it is a question Isaiah hears – and Isaiah responds to the call — "Here am I. Send me!". Isaiah is told to go — to go and fulfil his role in God's mission. The same was true of Moses, Abram, Samuel...and many more. And it is the same for us today. We often talk about our mission or the church's mission - but it is always God's mission. As individuals and as the

Church, we must always be seeking God's will and joining in with God's mission even when, and perhaps especially when, it means setting aside our own agendas. Tim Dearborn writes 'The Church of God does not have a mission in the world' . . . it is more accurate to say that 'The God of mission has a church in the world'. Whose mission is it — it's Gods.

But why mission? As a child I remember the odd occasion when I had obviously asked the question "Why?", a little too persistently and the response came back 'Because I said so, because it's important'. Why mission? Because it is our commission as disciples of Jesus Christ. It is part of the very last message Matthew records Jesus giving to his disciples before he ascended into heaven. Having called the disciples three years or so before, with all the authority of heaven and earth that has been given to him, Jesus commissions them — "...go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to observe everything I have commanded you. As the Church we are the body of Christ. Our task is to continue to deepen in our relationship with Jesus and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ and to do it all, not in our strength but in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Whose mission – is it. It is God's. Why mission? Because it is our calling through worship, learning and caring, service and evangelism to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. And that partly answers the third of the three questions I posed at the start of this sermon. What mission? Several decades ago, the Anglican Communion published a document containing the Five Marks of Mission. The first – to proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom and the second, as in our reading from Matthew's Gospel – to teach, baptise and nurture new believers. The third is to respond to human need by loving service. To fulfil our calling as disciples of Jesus – to fulfil God's mission – includes caring for our neighbour and serving others. This links with the fourth mark of mission – to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation. Loving service involves recognising injustice at work and working for change, striving for barriers to be broken down and peace to reign, in the name of the Prince of Peace. Finally, the fifth mark of mission is to strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth. By grace we are called and commissioned for God's mission in God's world. We are called to be good stewards of God's creation and our newly formed Eco-Circuit team will be

helping us in the months to come to think about how, as individuals and congregations, we can each continue to fulfil this part of our calling.

Friends, as we work together in God's service, for the extension of God's kingdom, as we put together plans, as we share ideas, may we listen always for God's voice in the words, and in the silence, in the expected and unexpected. May God, by the Holy Spirit direct all our thoughts, words and actions and may we respond to God's call with the words "Here am I. Send me!" AMEN
