Bible reading – Luke 2: 18-20

Reflection - Don't be afraid

Some people will have seen before, this olive wood nativity set I bought in Bethlehem. The carver has made the figures of the holy family, a shepherd and animals. There are also three Magi, but they're separated from the newborn Jesus by an enormous wall with a watchtower. This is a representation – to scale - of the separation barrier that surrounds present-day Bethlehem, cutting it off from Jerusalem. It reminds me to pray for my sisters and brothers in Bethlehem and Palestine, where every aspect of life is controlled by the illegal Israeli Occupation. It also reminds me of the turbulent world we live in, and the dangerous world into which Jesus was born over two thousand years ago. There was an occupying force – the Roman Empire – which made life cruel and hard. Mary and Joseph, after all, had had a long arduous journey from Nazareth because of the Roman census. After the birth of Jesus in a borrowed manger, they would have to flee to Egypt to escape the slaughter of innocent boys by King Herod.



Several years ago, Elias Najjar of the Palestinian Bible Society, speaking from Bethlehem about Advent hope, said, "I want people not to be afraid."

It was in a dangerous and difficult time and place, that angels, God's messengers, proclaimed, on a number of occasions around the time of Jesus' birth, "Don't be afraid!"

To Mary, to Joseph, to the shepherds, came the reassuring "Don't be afraid."

And that comes to us this Christmas Day 2022 – Don't be afraid.

Of course, it's easy to say the words. How can we trust them? How can we live in today's world without fear?

I've been pondering again recently, the difference between belief and faith. To be a follower of Jesus, a Christian disciple, is to hold both belief and faith. *Belief* is mainly about the act of holding a set or system of beliefs, and primarily involves the mind. This is important, but it's not the same as faith. Faith is about *trust* in God, and about not knowing everything. It has an element of mystery.

Richard Rohr wrote: "True faith involves not knowing and even not needing to know, but we made faith demanding to know and insisting that we do know! we trust that God alone steers this mysterious universe, where there is clearly much hidden from us and much still before us (New Testament faith) is foundational confidence or trust that God cares about what is happening right now".

The birth of Jesus – God taking human flesh to live among us - invites our faith, our trust, our confidence that God cares for this world God made.

The shepherds came and *saw*. There must have been so many questions in their minds. They were mainly uneducated men. They didn't leave the manger with a set of beliefs about God. But they were transformed by the experience, and they were filled with joy, and rushed into the town to tell everyone what they had seen. Fear was gone, to be replaced with faith and joy.

Mary, too, was left pondering all that had happened, no doubt trying to make some kind of sense of it all. She couldn't have understood everything, but there's no doubt that she trusted God as she treasured in her heart the events at Bethlehem.

In the little town of Bethlehem, the hopes and fears of all the years came together.

This year, the Mayor of the city of Bethlehem sent greetings to us in the west from the city where the Prince of Peace was born. He said, "We celebrate with you the birth of light that came in the midst of darkness and oppression. We celebrate this light even as this darkness continues for the Palestinian people in general and the people of Bethlehem in particular."

Jesus speaks to something deep within us - longings for something greater, more real. Today, as then, Jesus speaks to our fear and anxiety - Don't be afraid.

Today we celebrate with joy, and without fear, that God has moved in among us. Jesus is Emmanuel – God with us, alongside us, *for* us.

I pray that, after this Christmas, we will not return to our old fearful ways, anxious about ourselves, our families, our country and our world.

May we continue to hear the angel voice — Don't be afraid, for I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord.

And, like the shepherds, may we keep the rumour of God alive.
