Dear Friends,

I have recently read the book *'Mother Teresa, Come be my Light — the revealing private writings of the Nobel Peace Prize Winner.'* I have found an authenticity and humility in her writings that is second to none. In a letter to one of her spiritual directors, she said, 'Without meekness, we can never be able to accept others nor love the other as He [Jesus] loves us. She saw her work among the poor not as social action but as being Jesus to those she served 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Speaking to her own sisters, she explained, "The work is God's work and not our work...how often we spoil God's work and try to get the glory for ourselves." I was truly captivated by Mother Teresa's deep longing for God — to be Christ to others in every action, every word, and every attitude. It is said that Mother Teresa was in constant contact with human distress, yet she never got accustomed to it. Each time she encountered the suffering poor, it made a real impact on her. She would repeat: "I have never seen so much suffering." She saw God's greatness in the ability of the poor and marginalized to bear so much suffering.

Throughout Mother Teresa's work among the poorest of the poor, she lived with a profound spiritual darkness and a constant feeling of spiritual aridity in her own life. Through the guidance of her spiritual directors she came to realise that her darkness was the spiritual side of her work, a sharing in Christ's redemptive suffering on the Cross. Her darkness was an identification with those she served. She was drawn mystically into the deep pain they experienced from feeling unwanted and rejected and living without God. She believed that it is only by being one with them that she could bring God into their lives and so bring them to God.

This sounds to me like what it means to participate in the incarnational mission of God. We begin again our journey of 'Advent' — that time of preparation and waiting for the coming of God in flesh in Jesus Christ. God saw our poverty and chose to come to earth in Jesus Christ to be one with us so that we might be one with God. Mother Teresa told a story of a

Man she encountered who lived in a small one-room shack made of tin and old cardboard. After she had cleaned the shack she found in the corner of the shack a big lamp full of dirt. She said to the man, "Don't you light this lamp, such a beautiful lamp. Don't you light it?" He replied "For whom? For months nobody has ever come to me. For whom will I light it?" The sisters started going to visit him every day for about 5 to 10 minutes and they started lighting the lamp until he got into the habit of lighting the lamp. After a while, the sisters would only drop by in the morning just to see how he was doing. Two years later the man sent word — "Tell Mother, my friend, the light she lit in my life is still burning."

Certainly, the light that Jesus brought into the world over 2000 years ago is a light that keeps burning in the lives of countless people around the world. As we light our Advent candles, may we too be reminded of the first flickers of Jesus' coming into the world; and may the light of Christ be kindled in our hearts afresh, so that the flames of justice and peace may burn brightly within us, releasing in our lives the transforming power of God made flesh in Jesus Christ, the Light and Hope of the world, this Advent, Christmas and always.

Lord, Jesus Christ, Light of the world,
kindle your light afresh in my heart,
and help me to keep burning for you
that I might be your light in a dark
world. **Amen**

May our journey through Advent, Christmas, the New Year and always, be filled with the Hope and Light of Christ!

Advent Liturgy 2022



Our Advent candle liturgy this year will involve the whole congregation and use the whole church.

There will be an 'Advent candle station' at four corners of the church, each with a large candle decorated with evergreen foilage.

They will be labelled for the four weeks of Advent with the words HOPE, PEACE, LOVE and JOY. The final candle (for Christmas Day) will be at the front of the church and labelled LIGHT OF THE WORLD.

Each week the congregation will be provided with paper and pens on arrival and are invited to write their own short prayers on that week's theme, before or during the liturgy. These prayers will be gathered and added to each 'station' after the service.

Each week the previous week's candles will be re-lit before the service begins and the new candle lit during the liturgy, with the congregation invited to turn to face that week's candle as it is lit.

The liturgy will include a short reading linked to that week's theme, time for people to write their own short prayers and a prayer to be read after that week's candle is lit. ***Each week there will be an opportunity to contribute to a Retiring Collection to support the people of Ukraine.***

We hope the liturgy will be a time of blessing as we journey through Advent together.




Christmas Medley Thursday 15 December 2.30 pm in the Lounge




Winklebury Housegroup



Seeing the Poppy with the Name of Ft/Lt Kenny on it Reminded me of the Following.....



When the Allies took Rome, they found that Mussolini had built a huge Sporting complex which he called Mussolini Stadium. This gave the Americans the idea to hold an athletic meeting for allied soldiers. They set a date and sent information to all the units in Italy asking for the names of entrants. We received this enquiry and not unusually, our Sports Officer (FI/Lt Kenny), called me in to discuss if we had anyone good enough to be put forward. It was obvious that the quality was going to be high so we decided, although we had some good athletes, we did not have enough quality to put anyone forward.

In conversation about this event to be, I did say how good it would be to go. He said he would check for details. About a week later he called me in to say he had checked up and it was not possible for us to go, as Rome was a captured city which was not yet running properly and so the only persons allowed in Rome were persons resident within the district of Rome, so it cut us out.

I thought that that was that and we could not go – hard luck. A little while later he called me in and said ‘I want to run something by you to see what you think’. He then said ‘we have a detachment outside of Rome which is within the district. This means that anyone at the detachment has a warrant to let them into the city’. He said he could get us a temporary posting to the detachment so that we could get permits. There would be no other help possible, no transport etc. We could be put up at the detachment and we would have to fall into the rules that apply. They would increase the rations but we would have to attend the meal times.

Four of us decided to risk it so he made the arrangements. It was a three-day event so he got us 5 days leave – one day there, and one day back. We were lucky on the way to Rome as we happened to have a vehicle going to the detachment so we begged a lift. It was most uncomfortable as it was a large open vehicle we called a Queen Mary with no comfort at all. The driver was able to show us the turning off the main road for future use. We were made welcome on our arrival and given some floor to sleep on and given details of the running of the place.

The event took place fairly late so we had some time to sight-see and we decided on the following: up in the morning – breakfast (as much as we could get) then into Rome. The first day we had to go to the Colosseum, we got there to find it had a six-foot fence round it with a locked gate and no-one there. We climbed over the fence and had a look round than back out. The second day we went to the Vatican to find the Pope was having an audience so we tagged on with about 200 others to find he spoke quite good English. The third day we walked round the Roman Forum etc.

The first day of the athletics we got a good position by the winning post and looked across the arena to the main entrance for the runners etc where there were steps down to the area itself.

The opening ceremony started with the Free French Band coming down these steps, they had white belts, white cross belts, white putties and white gauntlets, a bit flash but not too bad and they were applauded somewhat. The next down was an American Band who came down the steps with heads bobbing up all over the place. They strolled across and to the side with hardly any applause. The next down was the band of the Grenadiers, down as one man to their own march and to the centre, all in the arena were on their feet

applauding – was good to be British. The athletics lived up to expectations and were very good indeed.

Now our trouble was to get back to the detachment where we had only made dinner on one occasion, the cook had left any surplus out for us so we ate it whatever it was. There was always some bread – I have never eaten so much bread in my life. Getting about we did manage to get lifts fairly easily mostly on military vehicles but sometimes on donkey carts. We found it was easier to split into two 'two's'. We hitched our way back to our unit having had a very hectic time but very enjoyable. We were very much envied by all and sundry.

Somber sequel – sometime later I was quite near to Fl/Lt Kenny when he was killed. Thank goodness he did not suffer – he was alive one minute and stone dead the next. I applied to go to his funeral but was not allowed as it was Officers only.

This is My Body Broken For You

Sometimes we do things by habit or ritual and perhaps lose sight of the original meaning or intent, and this can apply to our taking the sacrament of Communion. In our Home Group we decided to examine the Biblical meaning of Communion as written in Matthew 26:26-28. "Jesus took bread, gave thanks and broke it.....Take and eat; this is my body this is my blood of the covenant" Luke 22:19 also includes "do this in remembrance of me". This is my take on it.

I don't think we dispute the meaning of the blood sacrifice as it was the practice in the time of Jesus to make annual blood sacrifices for the forgiveness of sins at the Temple in Jerusalem, with the sacrifice of the best of their flocks, including bulls, goats and calves. The crucifixion of Jesus as the one and only Son of God brought this to finality. Our drinking of the wine is our acceptance that Jesus shed blood, died and paid the price for our sins, and our reflection on what this means for us. Hebrews 9:22, "without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness".


The meaning of the breaking of the bread, taking and eating it, however, is not so easy to fully understand. Jesus died on the cross in the most brutal and torturous manner that the Romans could devise. Crucifixion was devised to prolong pain and suffering by breaking and tearing the body apart, after flogging designed to tear the skin and flesh from the victim. Why might we ask was this brutality necessary as the Jewish sacrifice only required death and not brutality? This I believe is God demonstrating to us the appalling brutality that mankind has inflicted on his fellow man in wars and subjugation since the earliest times. This needed to be paid for in the sacrifice of His Son in a like manner to be credible. The breaking of the bread and taking a broken piece in our hand is therefore fundamentally important, so we can meditate upon the depth and meaning of Christ's sacrifice both for our own sins, and the appalling sins of man, continuing now in today's world. Taking food by hand was the norm in New Testament times, and we should do so today for this sacrament.

Finally, the eating of the bread is a very significant part of the sacrament as we are now remembering and fully accepting not only Christ's sacrifice, but also His teaching and Commandments here and now in today's world. The taking of the bread at the Last Supper would not have been a small morsel quickly swallowed, but a portion to be chewed and savoured, thus giving the disciples time to ponder on its meaning and their future calling. We as Believers today should also be asking ourselves what we should be doing in obedience to Christ's teaching, in the sure knowledge that we have His indwelling Holy Spirit to empower us into action.

No Eucharist miracles here with the bread and wine becoming physical flesh and blood, nor wafers taken on the tongue, and no need for any of them either. What we have is symbolism of the miracle of the once for all time blood sacrifice of Jesus for the Salvation of all mankind, and also the miracle of our growing personal relationship with the Holy Spirit living in the hearts of each one of us Believers giving us His love, power, support, guidance, and importantly motivating and empowering us to go out and do His work, and indeed miracles anew.

Bee a Friend

I read a very interesting article in this September's edition of the Saga magazine on the life of bees and their importance in our wildlife today, the work they do in pollinating our wildlife, and also the contribution they make to our main agricultural crops where almost 80% are dependent on insect pollination. The honey they produce, which many of us enjoy, also has many impressive medical properties. Sadly, though bees are in decline as the conclusion in the article explains. I have included it here as its importance cannot be ignored.



“One in ten of the wild bee species in Europe is in danger of extinction – 35 species are endangered in the UK, with 20 lost in the past 100 years. This is due to intensive farming, pesticide use, climate change, air pollution, and the fact that 97% of wildflower meadows in the UK have been lost in the past century.”

Now looking on the positive side, I visited the gardens at the Vyne, National Trust, here in Basingstoke, and was amazed at the bee and insect populations I encountered there. I enclose pictures of a honeybee, a wasp and a fly on beautiful dahlia blossoms taken in late October. The National Trust are doing an amazing job in preserving and in many cases recreating our natural wildlife environment. In the Vyne walled garden they have created wildgrass areas of amazing beauty and diversity. They also have planted and nurtured a large variety of dahlia shrubs, which are attractive to us in their natural beauty, but more importantly a Godsend to the Bee and insect populations in sustaining them. All credit to the National Trust, its volunteers, and those that support this amazing and progressive organisation.

God has given us custody of His Creation, and we can now clearly see that we are not honoring His trust in us worldwide. We should ask ourselves, what contribution can we make, maybe even in our own gardens to **“Bee a Friend”**?

Chaplaincy Prayer Letter – Autumn & Winter 2022



A recent Anglican prayer for the day begins: “Almighty God, you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless till they find their rest in you..” Salman Rushdie said: ‘I don’t have a God, but I have a God-shaped hole inside of me’, and many people concur with him. We do seem to have been made that way so we are all seeking after God, which these days is often expressed as ‘being spiritual but not religious’. Churches do a good job inviting people to meet with God through their many varied activities. There are regular and special services conducted along with playgroups, foodbanks, events and courses.

Chaplains in the town have a supplementary role in meeting others and engaging with people who are not considering God in their lives but who want to talk about issues they have. Especially in the last three years people seem much more open to discussing their lives and are willing to think about God and whether He cares about them.

Chaplains are open about their faith and wear a uniform, which people find reassuring. Many conversations begin as polite engagements which then lead to trust and greater openness. By being friendly and interested in other people Chaplains are able to listen with concern as people unburden themselves. They can help them put their life and concerns into context, consider their options and maybe offer suggestions which might help.

Chaplains are not founts of all knowledge but empathise and can often signpost people to where more help is available. This could include referring people to a local church; we are looking to strengthen links with local churches. We also offer to pray for people, or even pray with them; the invitation is usually welcomed.

Conversations are confidential so we cannot share too much. However, we can say that we are made very welcome in many shops in town, at the Magistrates’ Court and elsewhere and we have got to know people by meeting them regularly in the streets.

If your church or fellowship would like someone to speak about the Town Chaplaincy, we would be delighted to do so. At a Sunday service we are happy to give a 5-minute introduction and then talk afterwards to anyone interested in learning more. Just send an email or leave a phone message to arrange it!

The prayer continues “pour your love into our hearts and draw us to yourself”. May that be a prayer for ourselves and also for others, that all may know the peace that God gives us through Jesus Christ.

First Sermon in British Sign Language at St Paul's Cathedral



A Baptist minister, the Revd Sue Whalley, has recently delivered the first ever known sermon in British Sign Language (BSL) at St Paul's Cathedral. The invitation grew out of a meeting in London between Deaf Church Leaders and Church of England Clergy.

Building on the momentum of the BSL Act last April (when British Sign Language was accepted as an official language in England and Wales), it was suggested that a Deaf person preach at St Paul's Cathedral.

A maximum of 30 Deaf people were expected to attend alongside the hearing visitors to the cathedral. But instead, 60 - 70 Deaf people turned up, "highlighting the importance and significance of the event."

Call for Benefits to Rise in Line with Prices

The President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Canon Graham Thompson, has joined a call for the Government to affirm its commitment to ensuring benefits rise in line with inflation. Along with the Revd Fiona Bennett, Moderator of General Assembly, United Reformed Church, and the Revd Lynn Green, General Secretary, Baptist Union of Great Britain, he points out: "The social security system should prevent families from being pushed into hardship, yet foodbanks are facing rapidly rising demand and almost half of claimants receiving Universal Credit report skipping meals to make ends meet. "The value of benefits has declined for the last decade and already an average family of four relying on Universal Credit will be £1,400 worse off this winter than last – despite the interventions already put in place. Against this background it would be outrageous to erode benefits further." (Parish Pump)

Jesus came to establish such peace through His death on the cross. Trusting the Prince of Peace in our lives brings peace with God. If we ignore this message of Christmas, we won't benefit from it. As the carol says, *'Joy to the world, the Lord has come, let earth receive her King.'*

The Foodbank is 10 years old! October was the 10th anniversary of the Basingstoke Foodbank. Every year since 2012 it has fed around 3,000 people in crisis in the Basingstoke & Deane area, including 800 children. Since 2012 a total of over 42,900 people have been fed and 488 tonnes of food distributed. “While we are immensely grateful to the people and businesses of Basingstoke for their support over the years, and for the sterling efforts of over 100 volunteers, we’re sad that in 2022 there is still a need for a foodbank in our town” said Phil Thomas, Chair of Trustees. “The current economic crisis means demand for our services is growing again and until the benefits system in this country is reformed, there will continue to be people and families in crisis with not enough to eat”.

The Foodbank provides a three-day supply of food to anyone in crisis who is referred to it by over 120 different agency teams across the town. There are now believed to be more foodbanks in the UK than there are branches of McDonald’s. The foodbank’s work is a massive achievement and a reflection of the fantastic effort by a dedicated group of volunteers from churches and the community across Basingstoke. The whole community of Basingstoke & Deane generously provide crisis food for some of the neediest people in our town” *said Phil.* (taken from *One Church Basingstoke*)
