#### Dear Friends

I am not a movie buff. The menfolk in my household are much keener to go to the cinema or watch films on the television. However, I can remember the last two films I watched. They were back-to-back last Christmas, when on a day off between Christmas and new year in a quiet house I stumbled across an Antony Hopkins' afternoon on the BBC and got drawn in to watching 'Shadowlands' followed by 'Remains of the Day' – both of which I really enjoyed. I made a resolution at that time to try and watch a few more films in 2023. Sadly, that resolution fell by the wayside as I don't think I have watched one since!

Having said all of that, I was fascinated by the title of a film that was one of the hits of 2022: 'Everything Everywhere All At Once' won many Oscars and other film awards and was very well reviewed by film critics the world over. I haven't seen the film but maybe you have? It was the title that fascinated me as it seemed to describe so much of the way that the world and life works in 2023.

Do you ever feel like there is so much going on in the world today and in the busyness of our own lives that there is too much happening all at once for us to keep up with. I've certainly felt it this year as so much has happened in my life and the life of my family. Maybe you've felt the same or had a similar feeling? The pace of life and our ability to know everything as it is happening means that we can be overloaded with information and calls on our time in a way that wasn't the case in the past. We can know so much about everything, everywhere, all at once. Everything, everywhere, is potentially at our fingertips and only an instant away.

As we begin Advent this year, I'm reminded amidst this reality that there is another way to live. The poet R S Thomas

in his poem 'Kneeling' explores the experience of kneeling in a church in the presence of God. It is a short poem but it ends with the line 'The meaning is in the waiting'. This line became the title and focus for an Advent book I read a few years ago by the theologian Paula Gooder. I'd recommend it. Her reflections unpack that we live in a world and a society that doesn't have to wait for anything. We can have everything, everywhere, all at once and so waiting for anything becomes unnecessary and a counter-cultural activity. Isn't this why Christmas produce begins to appear in many supermarkets and shops in early autumn? Why you can 'buy now, pay later'? It's also why, even in the church dare I say, we begin to celebrate Christmas from the start of December rather than attend to Advent, a time of waiting to prepare ourselves for Jesus' birth and what this means for us and the world today.

I'm aware that everyone feels a little differently about this. I'm married to the unofficial Mr Christmas! I would put a Christmas tree and decorations up in our house some time after the 20th December but Mr Christmas adorns our house (beautifully, it has to be said) around 1st December. I try not to be bah humbug about it. But I think it's important that we take time in Advent to pause, to stop at some point each day and ponder our own lives, our relationship with God and what might come from waiting on God each day. I need help and discipline to do this so I have signed up to the Methodist Church's set of Advent reflections called 'Out of the Ordinary' which will drop a daily e-mail into my inbox at 6am(!) each morning of the Advent season. You can sign up via the Methodist church website too. I've also bought 'Stick with Love' by Arun Arora to guide my thoughts and help me focus.

Eventually we shall get to Christmas and then the New Year but not before we have prepared ourselves for this. So, my prayer for each one of us is for a thoughtful Advent, a joyous Christmas and a hope-filled new year and that we will come to these not all at once, but in time, as we journey and wait on God for 'the meaning is in the waiting'.



## MINUTES OF THE ST ANDREWS/TRINITY CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON 30<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER 2023 at 2.00pm. Venue: St Andrews/Trinity Church

**Present**: There were 25 people present.

- 1. **WELCOME**: A warm welcome to all from Revd Claire as we prepared ourselves for the first Church Council meeting of the amalgamated Churches. Looking at the scope of the Agenda, it was agreed that some items would have to be deferred to the next meeting, and Revd Claire prioritised those items for discussion today.
- 2. **OPENING DEVOTIONS**: A Bible reading followed by a prayer.
- 3. APOLOGIES received from: Peggy Wood, Katrina Cox and Jenny Leighton.

#### 4. ELECTION OF EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS

<u>Church Council Secretary</u> – Barbara Johnson proposed by Revd Claire and seconded by Theresa Strachan. Agreed by unanimous vote.

<u>Treasurer</u> – Sarah Whithorn was proposed by Llyn Frost and seconded by Diane Bath. Agreed by a unanimous vote of 21 for, none against, no abstentions.

<u>Pastoral Secretary</u> – Revd Claire explained that this role was still vacant. Linda Hoe and Diane Bath were overseeing pastoral care for the time being until the post is filled.

#### 5. ELECTION OF MEMBERS TO THE CHURCH COUNCIL

These people would reflect all areas of the wider Church in going forward and help to shape our new community and mission. The following Church members were proposed and elected en-bloc:- Peter Ansell, Ann Walker, Revd Angela Webb, David Webb, Hillary Reed, and Helen Blake. Agreed by a unanimous vote.

#### 6. CIRCUIT MEETINGS REPRESENTATIVES

Our current membership is 79 from Trinity, and 37 from St Andrews which includes three new members, making a total membership of 116. Therefore, we have 3 vacancies. Revd Claire proposed two Church members, Viviann Edwards and Bob Lock. Viv and Bob were elected unanimously. It was noted that the two Senior Stewards and the Church Treasurer, also attend the Circuit meetings.

#### 7. PROPERTY

Revd Claire thanked Bob and Michael for forwarding their respective reports.

Key Register: Llyn Frost said she had the current records to September 2023 and would pass them to Bob. Bob thanked her for the work she has done keeping records and issuing keys over many years. He will carry out a review in due course.

#### Photocopier/printer at Trinity Office

Peter Harris gave a comprehensive breakdown of the costs involved if Trinity were to cancel their existing lease contract, and return the machine to the supplier. He also outlined the alternative suggestion from the suppliers who have offered St Andrews a three year lease contract.

The meeting discussed the various options available. Barbara put forward a proposal that based on the information given does Church Council wish to commit to a new lease and transfer the existing machine from Trinity to St Andrews. Bob seconded this proposal. It was agreed by a majority.

#### **Outstanding Items from Trinity**

Michael Parker said the Font was available to St Andrews/Trinity Church as an interim font, until such times as the Church decides what type of font they wish to purchase for our new Church.

Everyone agreed that this would be a good idea with a Baptism coming up soon.

**The Memorial Table** is now located in the entrance to the Church.

#### Trinity Church Inventory - Surplus items

During the Inventory several people identified objects they wished to have. Those people are asked to liaise with either Tony or Michael to arrange collection. It was agreed with Martin Beukes that no charge will be made, but a donation to St Andrews/Trinity Church would be more appropriate for the items taken.

Within Trinity Church there is a lot of wood that could be re-purposed, and Angela wondered if it could be made into small crosses or hand-held size crosses, that Church members could have as a keepsake.

#### Girls Brigade/Boys Brigade Flags at Trinity Church

Theresa had confirmation from Headquarters that the flags at Trinity cannot be displayed at St Andrews/Trinity as both the Boys and Girls Brigade had been decommissioned.

#### **Grey Upholstered folding Chairs from Trinity (32)**

There was a discussion on the merit of various chairs for the different groups that use the Church. Theresa proposed that they accept the 32 grey chairs from Trinity as they fold up and take less space than the existing ones. Seconded by Tony. Agreed by a majority vote of 11 for and 7 against. Revd Claire gave a vote of thanks to all those working behind the scenes.

#### 8. FINANCE

Margaret Hayes reported that the Standard Form of Accounts for Trinity had been signed off by Alan Harland. These need to be signed and approved by Church Council as they form part of our annual return to the Charities Commission. Proposed by Margaret Hayes and seconded by Michael Parker. Agreed unanimously.

Margaret then discussed St Andrews finances which had benefited from the injection of funds from Trinity Church.

#### **Church Signatories**

Margaret confirmed that while Trinity Church signatories will stay the same until closure of the Church next Spring, it was necessary to review the signatories for St Andrews. Margaret Hayes proposed that the following six Church members become signatories for St Andrews and be voted en-bloc. Seconded by Theresa Strachan.

Sarah Whithorn, Margaret Hayes, Linda Hoe, Robert Lock, Llyn Frost, Diane Bath.

21 votes in favour, non against, no abstentions.

Margaret concluded her report, and there were no questions.

#### 9. SAFEGUARDING

Revd Claire proposed Margaret Hayes as the Safeguarding Officer for our new Church. Seconded by Pauline Ansell and agreed unanimously. Margaret had prepared the Safeguarding Policy Statement for Church Council's approval, which has to be signed by our Minister and posted on the Church notice board. Revd Claire proposed acceptance of the Safeguarding Policy Statement. Seconded by Peter Harris, and agreed unanimously.

Safeguarding Training or Refresher Training

Several members were now due for the Safeguarding refresher course. Dates yet to be agreed.

#### 10. **GDPR**

As yet, we have no volunteer for this role Revd Claire said that people need to be mindful about GDPR and what it is they are agreeing to. As a first step Revd Claire suggested a Data Mapping exercise.

#### 11. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

#### **Looking Forward**

Revd Claire was mindful that people were concerned about what we are going to call ourselves and our new Church community. This is an important issue that will have to be revisited, but she was hopeful that as we begin to work together, there might emerge from us something that might be obvious as a name; a sense of the right name and the right time. We must hold together all the different feelings about this until we all meet together again.

We were able to walk to Eltham Palace, now administered by English Heritage, using the Green Chain footpath.

We passed the donkeys in the field, and being up high had a good view across to Greenwich, and the river Thames.

I saw again the fields where I had played with friends, and the unpretentious council flat where I lived with my parents.

We finished the day at 'The Tarn,' a man-made lake, away from the hustle and noise of the traffic. An oasis of calm.



## MINUTES OF THE ST ANDREWS/TRINITY CHUCH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 27 NOVEMBER 2023 AT 3.00pm

Present: 20 members attended.

**Welcome:** Revd Claire expressed her appreciation to CC members for accommodating the later start of 3.00pm.

- 1. **Opening Devotions**: Our Church prayer read by Revd Claire.
- 2. **Apologies**: 10 members sent their apologies.
- 3. Minutes of the Meeting held on 30<sup>th</sup> October 2023 were accepted as a true record.
- 4. Matters Arising: None
- 5. **Property:** RL gave an update on the roof leak. RL reported that the shutters / partitions in the Church had been serviced; gutters had been cleaned and a few roof tiles replaced. Items outstanding are the boiler service, emergency lighting, and batteries need replacing in the Fire & Security system. RL told the meeting of an incident that happened outside the Church building which he had subsequently reported to the police.

**Lettings**: The Bowls Club had recently cancelled its lettings contract but had sent a very complimentary letter to RL thanking St A's for its hospitality and enclosing a donation of £200 to be given to a charity of our choice. Church Council agreed that the cheque should be paid into our bank account and will decide after Christmas to which charity it should go to. Item for next CC meeting agenda. BJ was asked to write a letter of thanks to the Bowls Club.

The ex Trinity Font was now in place for the Baptism on Sunday.

Flags: A recent Stewards meeting discussed the Trinity GB/BB flags that could no longer be displayed in Church, and suggested having something like a plaque to commemorate the long history of the Boys and Girls Brigades in the Methodist Church. Church Council agreed that this idea should be taken forward. TS spoke about the future of Boys Brigade. She explained how her group use the TV screen in the Mug and Biscuit, and suggested that this technology could be better utilised. A suggestion would be to have the TV screen showing throughout the day, images of Boys Brigade activities, advertise other Church events, or anything we wished as a Church to promote. The screen can also be seen from outside by passers by. After some discussion it was agreed that this idea should be explored further.

**Storage In the Roof:** Historically this area could not be used because bats had taken up residence. The bats have now gone and the space could now be used for much needed storage. Property Stewards were asked to take this forward.

**Keys:** LF confirmed that she had now handed everything over to RL. Revd Claire gave a vote of thanks to LF for all her hard work over several years.

- Finance: LF confirmed that she had deposited £30,000 (as instructed by our Treasurer) into St A's HSBC Bank account.
- 7. <u>Trusteeship</u>: Revd Claire talked about the responsibilities of being a Managing Trustee and she encouraged all elected Church Council members to look at the Methodist Website. TP stated that all CC members were responsible for ensuring

7. That our accounts were administered correctly. MP will send BJ the website link to be sent to all CC members so they can access the Methodist website and go to the relevant section which explains Trusteeship. TP asked that the Financial Report from our Treasurer be circulated to CC members prior to the meeting date, so they can study it before the meeting. Revd Claire confirmed that this would be done.

- 8. Reports from other Groups: DB reported that the combined Housegroups were meeting up on 21 December at 2.30pm in St A's. for a Christmas Medley of Carols, music, prose and poetry, plus tea and mince pies. Everyone is welcome so do come along and join in the fellowship.
- 9. Setting priorities for the new Church community:
  - Revd Claire issued each group a set of written questions for discussion; What in our Church has gone well? What could be better or done differently? How might we set priorities for the next 12 months? Revd Claire suggested that as a guide and starting point for discussion it would be useful to look at our Commitment Card, our new Church Prayer, and 'Our Calling' on our Methodist membership card. There was a lively discussion and subsequently each group gave their feedback on questions which were written on a flip chart. The points on the flip charts are attached to these minutes as Appendix 1. In summarising Revd Claire said that we are now moving into Advent and Christmas, but what we want to aim to do in the new year is to try and gather people round the priorities we have highlighted this afternoon; the formation of a Worship Group, a Tech Team exploring how we use available technology in Worship, and an essential Communication Link to be established.

When you are struck by a word or a phrase **STOP**.


**Stay** with the words that moved you, maybe repeating them slowly, allowing them to sink into your heart.

## Help people out of modern slavery (PP)

The Salvation Army offered more than 10,000 people modern-slavery victim support last year, under its government contract. It was the highest since the arrangement began, and included more than 3,000 new referrals.

It is now 12 years since the Government contracted the Salvation Army to provide specialist support for adult victims of modern slavery in England and Wales.

The victims had experienced a range of abuse, including forced labour, sexual exploitation, criminal exploitation, and domestic servitude.

The Bishop of Bristol, the Rt Revd Vivienne Faull, said that the figures were "a stark reminder of the persistent challenges we face in our own community, and a testament to the vital role played by dedicated organisations."

"Holy desires are different than surface wants, like "I want a new car" or "I want a new computer."

Instead I'm talking about our deepest desires, the ones that shape our lives: desires that help us know who we are to become and what we are to do.

Our deep desires help us know God's desires for us, and how much God desires to be with us.

And God, I believe, encourages us to "notice" and "name" these desires, in the same way that Jesus encouraged Bartimaeus, the blind beggar to articulate his desire. "What do you want me to do for you?" he asked."

#### Tips to Protect things from Freezing (PP)

This may look silly, but it works: cover your windscreen wipers with old socks, to stop them sticking to the windscreen on a freezing morning. The RAC warns that if windscreen wipers cannot move, there is a risk the circuit will overheat and blow a fuse.

If you are cycling to work, try wearing a swimming cap under your cycling helmet – Cycling UK recommends it as a good extra layer, to keep warm.

If you need to be outside for long, wear several thin layers instead of one big chunky one. The UK Health Security Agency says that the air which gets trapped between the layers also helps keep you warm.

#### No more 'Postcode Lottery' Recycling (PP)

Life is going to become simpler when it comes to recycling. From 2026, the national recycling laws are to be standardised, with Councils across the UK all having to collect the same glass, metal, plastic, paper and card, food waste and garden waste. It is expected that the plans will lead to packaging that is clearly labelled 'recyclable' or not, without the need for households to check local provisions. "Simpler recycling will help us all recycle more

help us all recycle more easily, doing our bit to help save the planet and make the best use of precious resources that we use every day," said Therese Coffey, the Environment Secretary. "Alongside weekly food waste collections, we are ending the postcode lottery of what you can put in your bin, so that wherever you live in the country, you will be able to

recycle the same products

with confidence."

#### Drink Tea or Coffee Each Day – and Keep Old Age Weakness Away!

Recent research has found that drinking coffee or tea in midlife may help keep you stronger in later life. A study at the National University of Singapore concluded that higher caffeine intake is associated with lower odds of physical frailty in old age, regardless of the source of the caffeine. Physical frailty in old age was defined as having at least two of the following: weight loss, exhaustion, slowness and weakness. The scientists also measured handgrip strength and the time taken to complete a timed up-and-go (TUG) test. In addition to caffeine, coffee and tea contain rich bioactive polyphenols, which have antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties. These have been associated with reduced risk for diseases that increase frailty, such as diabetes, cardiovascular diseases, obesity and neurodegenerative disease. (*PP*)

#### The Heart of Christmas, Canon Paul Hardingham, PP

We're at that time of year again! But is Christmas just about the shopping, tree or presents? At its heart, Christmas is all about a God who has showed up on earth. The Creator of the universe, whose hands flung stars into space, cared enough to come to earth as a tiny baby. The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us.' (John 1:14).

Every year we sing carols and retell the same story of the donkey, innkeeper, stable, angels, shepherds, star, wise men, gifts and Mary and Joseph with baby! Why do we do all this? It's to remind us that God deals with the mess of our world by sending His Son to die in our place. This makes it possible for us to have a relationship with Himself:

When the time came, He "did not consider equality with God something to be used to His own advantage; rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to death — even death on a cross! (Philippians 2:6-8).

Reflecting on Jesus in the manger is a great place to start understanding the heart of the Christmas message. However, it's so much more than simply a cute baby lying in the bed of straw:

If our greatest need had been information, God would have sent us an educator; If our greatest need had been technology, God would have sent us a scientist; If our greatest need had been money, God would have sent us an economist; If our greatest need had been pleasure, God would have sent us an entertainer; But our greatest need was forgiveness, so God sent us a Saviour.

#### The Most Beautiful Story, Canon David Winter reflects on the coming of Jesus..

A well-known atheist was once interviewed on Radio 4. When asked how he spent Christmas, and he said that he went to Midnight Mass at church. 'But you're an atheist', his interviewer protested. 'Yes', he replied, 'but what they celebrate at Christmas is the most beautiful story ever told'.

That 'beautiful story' tells of a Creator who sent His Son to share the life of His creation, to be born as a helpless baby, to grow up as a man of extraordinary wisdom, gentleness and love, who was executed by the authorities for contradicting the traditions of the time. His followers – who today number about two billion people all over the world – believe that He rose from the dead, and that by His death and resurrection He has made possible forgiveness and eternal life for men and women everywhere.

That is certainly quite a story, perhaps the greatest story ever told, and yes, beautiful. And that is the story that will be rehearsed again this Christmas, in children's Nativities, in hymns and carols, in Bible readings and sermons all over the country. People who stay away from church all year turn up to hear it, and who can blame them? This is a story of hope, of love and of heaven touching earth.

Most of us are familiar with probably the best-known statue in the world, Christ the Redeemer, towering over Rio de Janeiro, His arms outstretched in blessing. Christmas celebrates the birth of that great Redeemer – a tiny baby laid in a feeding trough. His birth changed history, His life transformed our understanding of what it means to be human, His death was at one and the same time a tragedy and a triumph. Yes, 'the most beautiful story ever told'. Enjoy it again this Christmas. *(PP)*

## Food Banks across the UK may be facing their 'Worst Winter' yet, (PP)

The Independent Food Aid Network (IFAN) has warned that the numbers of people needing foodbanks this year are still rising, as the cost-of-living crisis continues.

The Trussell Trust, which runs the UK's largest network of food banks, expects to support more than 600,000 people between December and February. This means handing out around one million food parcels, or an average of one parcel every eight seconds, which is 11,500 parcels a day, making it the "worst winter yet" for the charity. These figures support what workers at Citizens Advice have found, that there is a "terrifying new normal of people living on empty."

To compound the problem, many independent food banks are now running low on donations. As the manager of one such foodbank recently told the IFAN, "Surplus food is down. Our collections are under 50% of what they were. It just doesn't work."

Paul O'Brien of social justice charity Micah Liverpool put it this way:

"Food banks cannot sustain this level of poverty for much longer."
Su Parrish, based at The Easter
Team in Crawley, explains a further problem for the foodbanks:

"Everyone is feeling the strain of struggling to support clients with increasingly complex needs. Most of our volunteers signed up to give out food parcels and be a friendly face spreading some love. They didn't anticipate the level of stress that our clients now exhibit because of the situations they find themselves in."
