Dear Friends

Summer is here once more, and we have been experiencing some lovely sunshine and warm weather. I hope it is not too hot for those who, like me, struggle with the summer heat. It is also that time of year when we as Methodist people often mark endings in preparation for new beginnings in September. The last five years have flown by so quickly, and it is that time again when we are respectively asked to embark on the new season God has called us to, both as individuals and as church communities.

Our time together is forever marked by the Coronavirus pandemic. I would always remember the online services we shared together during those challenging months. Covid-19 has enabled many churches to seriously look at themselves and their future. We have witnessed both St Andrew's and Trinity Methodist Churches grow in their friendship and fellowship, as they regularly shared in united services and social events. naturally which has led SO amalgamation. It has been a privilege (and a challenge) to have journeyed with you all over these last five years. Thank you for allowing me to share in your times of sorrows, challenges, joys, and celebrations; individuals, families. and church as communities. I would hold and cherish those precious memories in my heart.

I particularly want to say thank you for your hospitality. I have certainly made life-long friendships, and I have learned a lot from your personal stories and faith journeys. The Basingstoke and Reading Circuit is my second appointment as a presbyter, and when I arrived in 2018, it all still felt very new to me. The churches I journeyed alongside in Basingstoke have enabled me to better inhabit my role as a presbyter and helped me to gain greater confidence in God's call for me. Regularly, I needed to draw from the inner resources and strength God has placed within me so I could respond

appropriately to the many challenges. These words from Isaiah 43:1-3 have been constantly on my mind over the last five years:

"...Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by your name; You are Mine.

When you pass through the waters, I will be with you;

And through the rivers, they shall not overflow you.

When you walk through the fire, you shall not be burned,

Nor shall the flame scorch you. For I am the Lord your God..."

Answering God's call as individuals and as a church community has both its opportunities and its challenges and yet one thing we can be certain of is that God is with us. One of my old pastors used to say to us as young people: 'God's will would never lead you where his grace cannot keep you.' I have proven this to be true in my own life over the past 12 years. When I first embraced God's call as a student presbyter I also knew that I would need to embrace all of the self-sacrifice that comes with it. I can boldly say that I have never for one moment lost confidence in God's presence on this journey.

St Andrew's and Trinity, the journey to truly becoming one church that serves the mission of God in his Son Jesus Christ, also has its opportunities as well as its challenges, and yet you all can take encouragement from Paul's words in Philippians 1:6, which says: "Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ." May your amalgamation bring forth the fruits of God's kingdom and of his Son Jesus Christ.

I offer to God this prayer as we look towards God's future for us as individuals and as church communities:

God of endings and new beginnings, you call us to different places and people at different times.


We trust you to be with us at this point of our journeys,


Positive Working Together

One of the projects of the Methodist Church is Positive Working Together. There is a lot of material on the Methodist Church website but I thought I would try to summarise some of it here as I think reflecting on it may help us become a loving Christ-centred community.

Key themes

Positive working together is viewed through the lens of three key themes:

- shared humanity;
- · journeying together in learning and understanding;
- · humanity s need of God s grace.





Promoting positive working relationships

On an everyday basis positive working together requires attention to how individuals communicate with each other and how people are treated.

In practical terms this means:

Communication

- paying attention to how we greet and address each other on an everyday basis, ensuring that we are at all times courteous, respectful and appropriate, regardless of the medium;
- being mindful of the impact our communication has on others and making efforts to understand our communication from the perspective of how it is received by others;
- being aware of how our power over others is communicated and taking measures to ensure that such power is not misused or abused;
- only communicating about other people what we would be prepared to communicate to them face-to-face unless there are overriding and justifiable reasons not to do so;
- making an effort to check with others whenever we fear we may have upset or offended them in order to promote confidence and clarity in our relationships with others;
- making time to genuinely listen to what others communicate to us particularly when the situation is sensitive or personally challenging to us.

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How we treat each other

· treating every person fairly, equally and with dignity and respect;

- behaving at all times with integrity, honesty and openness;
- adjusting our behaviour, including language, if we understand it to be causing offence;
- bringing unfair treatment to the attention of others so as to avoid it being repeated;
- challenging inappropriate or unacceptable behaviour we have witnessed and doing this in a constructive, sensitive and proportionate way;
- responding to criticism of our own behaviour by genuinely listening to what is being said, remaining calm and reflecting honestly on its potential validity before responding;
- · being aware that at times we may lack self-awareness and that this may impact negatively on our behaviour.

NEW BEGININGS

Having said his final goodbyes, he went across to the workshop. He leaned against the wooden bench and studied the tools, all carefully hung on the wall, each with its own designated space. The familiar smell of sawdust hung in the air.

It didn't seem that long ago when he was just a boy, working alongside his father, and learning the skills of carpentry. Now he was older his parents had accepted that he was leaving them to tread quite a different path.

Nearby, there were a couple of items waiting to be repaired, but on the far side of the workshop, thrown in an untidy heap, were the offcuts of wood, and odd bits of broken chairs. His eyes were drawn to what appeared to be a complete chair, but on closer inspection he realised that one of the back supports was cracked making the chair dangerously unstable. Further down he found to his surprise a sturdy chair of good wood, but he could see it was missing a leg. Later, he cleaned off the tools he had used and carefully placed them back on the wall. Now, next to the bench stood a chair. He viewed his handiwork with some satisfaction knowing that he had taken a couple of old chairs that were no longer serviceable, and created from them a new chair that was good and strong that would last for many years.

He closed the door behind him, shook the sawdust off his sandals and set off on his journey.

Apologies from Old Basing: It has been brought to my attention recently that we at Old Basing made an unfortunate error in omitting to report the sad passing of our dear friend Joan Winfield, who had been attending worship right to the end. We realise she had previously been well known to many of you as she attended many Circuit occasions that took place in Basingstoke especially going back to her time in North Warnborough, Lee

• 65 years ago, on 26 July 1958, debutantes were presented at the British royal court for the last time.

The Hundred Guinea Oak Tree, National Trust, The Vyne, Basingstoke

The ancient oak tree, thought to be 650 years old, owes its long life, to William John Chute, who opened the Vyne, during the 19th century.

It's believed it gained its name after he refused to sell it to a naval agent, looking for timber at the time of the Battle of Trafalgar.

When Chute refused the first offer of £100, the agent returned the following day offered £100 Guineas.

According to diary entries written at the time, Chute said 'Any tree, that increases in value by £5 overnight, is too valuable an investment to lose.'

The hundred guinea oak has been present for many key moments in the Vyne's history.

In Tudor times it saw royal visitors, including Henry V111 with Catherine of Aragon, and Anne Boleyn, and during the 2nd world war, it witnessed the estate being used to shelter evacuees.

Over its life-time it also supported a variety of wildlife. It is a favored resting place for jackdaws, nuthatches, and squirrels, can frequently be seen moving around the branches. Fungal decay has slowly hollowed out the trunk, which provides shelter for invertebrates.

How we care for the tree. Rare and ancient trees need special care. To make sure it can withstand bad weather, we treated the tree by hooking it up to movement sensors, and exerting a force on Its position, tells how it fares against a prevailing wind.

We treat the roots with a lovingly deep layer of wood chip, and a solution of compost steeped in microbes. The process improves the air in the soil, and makes the nutrients more easily absorbed by the tree.

One hundred Guineas is worth the same as £105 in modern money. Today Guineas are used to sell horses.

Very approximately £100 is equivalent in purchasing power today to £17,000. A real investment, too good as Chute said, to lose.

Trefoil Guild (Girl Guiding) is celebrating 80 years this year, since its formation, the Oak Tree has been chosen as a symbol of long life in the UK.

Stepping out in faith on Zoom

Sunday worship at the Church of the Living Stream is now shared by more people than who attended our now closed church building, says Ian Harrison



IT all began with lockdown. We were/ are a small Methodist church on the outskirts of Basingstoke, but one where people enjoy fellowship and mutual support. support. Lockdown in 2020

brought things to an abrupt halt, but we wanted to continue to worship together in a meaningful way. At the time the online Zoom package was in its infancy so a bit of learning on the hoof was required.

We found that by carefully arranging

carefully arranging services to a shorter format we could fit nicely into the free 40 minute allowance.

And that's what we do: not a five-hymn

sandwich but a tailored interactive service with people reading the Bible, prayers and a reflection/ sermon top and tailed by two hymns with video visuals to match the words.

Mary Magdalene (by Canon Paul Hardingham, Parish Pump)

Six Marys are mentioned in the New Testament, including Mary Magdalene, who is remembered this month in the church's calendar. What can we learn from Mary's story?

We don't have to be defined by our past: When Jesus encountered Mary, He cast seven demons out of her (Luke 8:2). As a result, her life was transformed and she became a follower of Jesus. Her life as a disciple was no longer defined by the person she had been before. Like Mary, we don't have to let our past without Christ dictate how we see ourselves today.

Put Jesus at the centre of our world: Along with some of the women who had been cured of evil spirits and diseases (Luke 8:1-3), Mary followed Jesus and His disciples and supported them in ministry. She was there at the cross (Matthew 27:55-56) and one of the first to the tomb on the Sunday (Matthew 28:1; Mark 16:1 and John 20:1-18). Like Mary, we are called to serve Jesus as dedicated disciples.

Jesus uses the weakest in the world: Mary is a great example of Paul's words: 'But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong.' (1 Corinthians 1:27). At a time when women were regarded as second-class citizens with no real autonomy, Jesus had a special compassion and care for women. Alongside Mary, the women's witness to the resurrection was taken seriously.

We should be careful not to dismiss the things that don't follow our expectations, because Jesus doesn't always do what we expect! He delights in working out His plans through unlikely people and in surprising ways. He did this through Mary, and if we let Him, He can do it through us!

Spiritual Disciplines: Solitude (by Canon Paul Hardingham, PP)

'Solitude is a time when we withdraw from the company of others in order to give God our undivided attention' (John Ortberg).

The spiritual discipline of *solitude* is about spending time alone with God, to grow in relationship with Him and hear Him more clearly. This practice was a priority in Jesus' life and ministry, especially at crucial moments eg 'Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed' (Mark 1:35).

Solitude is not so much about what we *do* as what we *don't* do! If we want to hear God, we need to consciously shut out the external noise in our lives and focus on the quiet inside us. If we are honest, this can be a real struggle. We want to do it, but other things can so easily get in the way: distractions, tiredness, jobs that need doing, wandering thoughts etc. Solitude gives us an opportunity to enjoy God's presence, as somebody who we really want to spend time with.

Richard Foster ('Celebration of Discipline') suggests some ways in which we might grow in this discipline: **'Little solitudes'**: small everyday moments to seek inner silence eg, coffee times, travelling to work and time spent outside. **Quiet place**: having specific places where we go to be quiet, eg a room or special chair in our home. **Retreat**: **organising a retreat where we can have time in silence and solitude.**

We need to plan carefully how we use our time with God, including silent listening, meditating on Scripture, prayer, journaling, taking a meditative walk, or listening to a worship CD. 'If we possess inward solitude we do not fear being alone, for we know that we are not alone.' (Richard Foster)

A couple of these I have included below.

We had a piece written by Carol Piggott about Women's Fellowship and David Webb shared memories of Junior Church across the years, mentioning the many people who had been involved in running Junior Church over a lot of years. The memories brought back many memories to us all, of people as well as of groups.

Heather Shepherd talked about our fantastic 'Weekends Away at Slavanka' in Bournemouth, she said:

"I have so many happy memories of our church weekends away at Slavanka. Refugees in the UK – some stories

How are the refugees who have come to the UK getting along? This month we continue our short series, with another story:

From the Revd Stephen Crofts in Cheriton:

Aziz came to us in the shadow of a friend, Habib, who was looking for a church to go to. They had fled Iran, because they

dared support the unrest against the government in the days before the news broke about Mahsa Amini – the young woman who died in prison after her arrest for wearing her hijab improperly. They had both left families behind. One day Aziz told us his family had arrived elsewhere in the UK but the migration system didn't seem to want to reunite them. We leaned on a charity who knew what to do. It took some weeks, but they managed to reunite the family. The day he showed me the letter authorising his move, the last day we would see him, I spotted him turn to the altar, head bowed, tears flowing. A week later, he sent us photos of himself with his family, a smile on his face I had never seen in his time with us. He has now found a church and is encouraging others join him.

Life-changing Audio Bibles for People with Sight Loss (PP)

At the end of 2021, Torch took "a leap of faith" and ordered 1,000 Pathway audio Bible players containing the New Testament and Psalms read by the actor David Suchet. Knowing the power of Scripture to change lives, they planned to "give these Bibles for free to anyone in the UK losing their sight. 16 months later, all of these Bible players have been sent out and the stories coming back are so amazing that Torch has ordered 1,000 more."

Gayle-Ann told us "It is my friend...with me wherever, it is just so convenient. I have read the New Testament, but the way this is read is just easily understood". **Kenneth** wouldn't have called himself a Christian, and hasn't enjoyed audio books, but 'I like listening to the Pathway. I'm really listening to the New Testament now, not just odd verses. I'm realising what it all means.'

Losing sight can be a time of real questioning and searching, so what better gift can a newly blind person receive than the Word of God? Torch is encouraging anyone who is living with sight loss to contact them for a free audio Bible at www.torchtrust.org/pathway, or by calling 28: 01858 438260. Most of the first 1,000 players were sponsored by individuals, churches or trusts. Torch is also seeking people to donate £20 to cover the cost of sending out one of the new audio Bibles.

UK Foodbanks Busier than ever

More food parcels were given out in the UK this past year than ever before. During December 2022, an emergency food parcel was handed out the equivalent of every eight seconds. These are the most recent figures from the Trussell Trust, which supports more than 1300 foodbanks in the UK.



In all, the charity says it gave out nearly three million food parcels between April 2022 and April 2023. More than one million of these were for children. These three million parcels from the charity's foodbanks represent a 37-per-cent increase in England on 2021. And more than 760,000 people used a foodbank for the first time, which is up more than one third in 2021-22.

Soaring inflation and energy costs have driven the increase in demand. The charity reports an unprecedented rise in the number of employed people using their foodbanks, because they are "no longer able to balance a low income against rising living costs." The problem now, says the trust, is that food donation levels are not keeping up with the need. "This is putting us under a lot of strain."

Some famous hymns of praise and thanksgiving were written in astonishing circumstances of pain and distress.

The story behind the HYMN: Now Thank We All Our God

Now thank we all our God
With heart and hands and voices,
Who wondrous things hath done,
In whom His world rejoices;
Who, from our mother's arms,
Hath blessed us on our way
With countless gifts of love,
And still is ours today.

Oh may this bounteous God
Through all our life be near us,
With ever joyful hearts
And blessed peace to cheer us;

And free us from all ills
In this world and the next.

The Father now be given,
The Son, and Him who reigns
With them in highest heaven,
The one eternal God,

The joy and serenity of this hymn are staggering, when you learn the circumstances in which it was written. Martin Rinkart was a pastor at Eilenberg, Saxony, during the terrible Thirty Years' War (1618-1648). As a walled city, Eilenberg offered some protection to the inhabitants. No wonder that political and military refugees of all sorts poured into the city, making it dangerously overcrowded. Soon the water supply was fouled, the sanitation overwhelmed, and the food ran out – leaving people famished and diseased.

In 1637 a terrible pestilence swept through the city, killing some 8,000 people, including Rinkart's beloved wife. By that time Rinkart was the only minister left in Eilenberg, because the others had either died or fled for their lives. Rinkart alone conducted the burial services for 4,480 people, sometimes taking as many as 40 to 50 funerals a day!

Eilenberg was besieged and overrun three times – once by the Austrian army and twice by the Swedes. When a Swedish general demanded the town pay him 30,000 thalers, Martin Rinkart pleaded that the impoverished city could never meet such a levy, but the general scorned him. At that, Rinkart turned to his companions and said: 'Come, my children, we can find no mercy with man; let us take refuge with God.' On his knees there and then, Rinkart led his friends in a fervent prayer and in the singing of a hymn. The Swedish commander was so moved that he decided that the levy be not 30,000 thalers, but instead 1,350 thalers.

Somehow, out of the hell of the Thirty Years War, came this lovely hymn of peace and total trust in God. Martin Rinkart had had to dig deep into his faith to survive, and the result was utter, serene dependence on God – despite chaos and destruction all around. *(from PP)*

THE FUTURE OF OUR RECYCLING

Over the years we have been recycling a variety of food and household packaging and wrappers. It started back in 2013, I believe, when we collected Danone yoghurt pots. After that it was coffee lids and pouches, biscuit wrappers, various household cleaning packaging / containers, baby food pouches and crisps. We always had 2 or 3 collections on the go, taking on a new one when TerraCycle removed any. In the beginning I was able to send in any quantity / weight of recycling but gradually a minimum weight was introduced. This meant storing the recycling at home until I had enough to send off. It was just about manageable and worth it for the funds raised which went to *Contesa*, now *Future Pillars Zambia*.

Sadly for us, the large Supermarkets have taken over much of the recycling we were doing which has affected us quite badly, especially with the loss of the Crisp Collection. We now only have recycling for biscuit wrappers and household cleaning items. Both of these are not as forthcoming as the crisps were and it takes a long time to collect enough for the minimum weight. Therefore, regretfully I am going to be closing the recycling programme later on this year. The recycling will continue until I have enough to send off the last shipment for both recyclings. We redeem our points for cash twice yearly, April 1st and November 1st. To ensure we raise as much money as possible, I will aim to send the last shipments in towards the end of October. This will give enough time for the points to be allocated to our account so that we can then redeem them.

Meanwhile, please help us to save as many biscuit wrappers as possible, savoury and sweet varieties, and the items from the household collection. These are the flexible packaging from dishwasher tablets, detergent, household wipes, tinted fabric conditioner bottles, tinted plastic tubs and plastic air fresheners. Through the money we raise we are to supporting many vulnerable girls in Zambia who through the charity of Future Pillars receive a safe place to live, food, education and skills training in order to move from poverty to a better and sustainable future for themselves and their families. Help us to help them.


