Dear Friends

All Change

This is the time of the year when the angle of the sun or some mysterious circadian rhythm makes me actually want to clean the house, declutter the cupboards and throw out all the dross and junk that has accumulated over the winter period. My bursts of energy don't always last very long but they can often leave both me and the rest of the family confused by all the upheaval. New places for familiar kitchen objects cause pandemonium and recriminations when they can't be found easily or when I can't remember where I put them or if I ejected them in a clutter clearance.

What I am trying to say is that this is a time of changes, major and minor, domestic, local and national and that these often leave us feeling a bit confused and bewildered as familiar places and patterns give way to new.

By the time you read this we will be well into Coronation preparations and celebrations, as our new King takes his official place as the Head of the Nation. All change there too, as he takes on new responsibilities and changes the team of "Royals" who perform ceremonial duties.

Our "JAM" Palm Sunday service emphasised the failure of most of the Jewish people to recognise the style of Jesus' Kingship as he entered Jerusalem with a message of love and peace instead of the pomp and fear which accompanied most other rulers of the time. It's scary when things change and many of us would rather stick to the familiar even if it is worse than the new alternative.

As a Church community we face lots of changes in the near future. This may mean giving up some familiar places, some familiar habits. However we need to hold on to the certainties of our faith and to the relationships and friendships we have already built while embracing the excitement of things that are new or different and welcoming people with

whom we have yet to connect.

I read the following recently and I hope you will feel that it speaks to you too.

I have paraphrased this message from The *Easter God by John V Taylor*:

We must remember that in the midst of change we are God's messengers of hopefulness.

In a world of sceptical manipulation we must keep on affirming that human nature and the world it creates can be changed and that the future is not being made or marred by us but coming to meet us from the hand of God.

When we think about the maintenance and mission of our church we need to remember that the tradition of which we are guardians is not a building or a village pond of stagnant water but an ever changing bubbling spring of newness of life. It is a well of living, lifegiving water backed by a promise of forgiveness and change which has no equal.

It is a new wine that will always break old wineskins with its life and vibrancy, generation after generation. We are the guardians of that wine and not the wineskins, of the hope and vitality of God's plan and Christ's message.

The Church is after all the servant of Him who says "Behold I am making all things new"

Enjoy your Spring cleaning, remember where to find the important things in your life and embrace change!

The Coronation of King Charles III by Canon Paul Hardingham (PP)

On 6 May His Majesty King Charles III will be crowned alongside Camilla, The Queen Consort, in Westminster Abbey. How can we pray for him, as he approaches this important event?

Paul says: 'I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness.' (1 Timothy 2:1,2).

For God's presence – to guide every aspect of King Charles' life as he prepares for his Coronation and future roles. At his Accession, he was proclaimed Defender of the Faith, the Supreme Governor of the Church of England. Charles has talked about 'the Sovereign's particular relationship and responsibility towards the Church of England – the Church in which my own faith is so deeply rooted.'

For God's wisdom – as he provides leadership that will honour God and promote the wellbeing of our society. King Solomon prayed for wisdom for himself: 'So give your servant a discerning heart to govern your people and to distinguish between right and wrong.' (1 Kings 3:9).

For God's love – to strengthen all relationships within the Royal Family; for reconciliation, understanding, forgiveness and good communication.

For God's purpose – to be fulfilled through the work of the King and Queen Consort and their family in the years to come. He has said: 'and whatever may be your background or beliefs, I shall endeavour to serve you with loyalty, respect and love, as I have throughout my life.'

A Prayer for the new King:

Everlasting God, we pray for our new King. Bless his reign and the life of our nation. Help us to work together so that truth and justice, harmony and fairness flourish among us; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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Journeying On

Bible Reading: Philippians 2.1-13

Paul is writing to the church at Philippi. He knows that they are united with Christ. He knows that they have received comfort from Christ's love and experienced the Fellowship of the Holy Spirit. He knows this in part because he has seen the tenderness and compassion with which they treat each other.

Paul then points out to them their growing edge, the place where there is room for improvement or learning. To assist their learning Paul reminds the Philippians of a hymn or a prayer that perhaps they would already have known.

He reminds them that their attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus. The hymn outlines Jesus' story.

Our passage ends with the words that I want to home in on.

- ".....keep on working with fear and trembling to complete your salvation, because God is always at work in you to make you willing and able to obey his own purpose." (GNB)
- "....continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfil his good purpose." (NIV)

I want to put this verse like this for us today, not just as individuals but as a community together. Paul was writing to the church at Philippi after all.

Keep working out what it means to live a Christ-centred life and live that life. Be amazed and awestruck as you realise that God's Spirit is at work in you giving you the desire and strength to do what most pleases God.

This reminds me of an occasion I was an inpatient in hospital. I happened to let on that I was a Methodist minister. The person that I was speaking to said she wasn't able to believe in God because of something that had happened in her family. Someone who was important to her had suffered and died. I said that I didn't have answers to all those questions. I did know that I was loved by God and called to work with God for good in all circumstances.

I don't know whether my answer helped the other lady in any way. I do know that when I need to refocus my life, those words often come to mind (as well as others). I know that I am loved by God and called to work with God for good in all circumstances.

I dare to believe with awe and wonder that God's Spirit is at work in us guiding our desires as we say what kind of community we want be.

So let's keep on working out together what it means to live a Christ-centred life.

Then let's encourage one another to live a Christ-centred life – asking for the enabling strength of the Holy Spirit.

Both Trinity Methodist Church and St Andrew's Methodist Church councils have agreed to explore together the possibility of joining together to form a new Christian community.

Journeying On, cont'd.....

One step in our exploration was a meeting together on 1st April to catch a glimpse of God's future for us. The commitment card which has been circulated was prepared following that day.

I have already received some feedback and have incorporated it into this picture.



During our service on 23rd April, there was an opportunity for further feedback. In the coming week, a group of us will reflect further on the commitment card in the light of this feedback.

During May and June, the two church councils will meet separately to decide whether they each wish to join with the other to create a new Christian community. They will make that decision on the basis of our joint glimpse of God's future for us.

If we do decide to join together to form a new Christian community, this commitment card will continue to be part of our becoming that new community.

This "becoming" will take place over time as we listen to each other, work together and learn together. We want to be an inclusive community. We can begin to become an inclusive community by including everyone's gifts and skills. Our new minister, Claire, who will be arriving in September will be key in this important stage of the process.

Watch out for the revised commitment card in the coming weeks!

COUNTDOWN TO THE CORONATION Of His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen Consort.

On Saturday 6th May the Coronation will take place.

It is based on a solemn religious ceremony which has remained largely unchanged for more than 1000 years. For the past 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, and is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury. King Charles III will be crowned, and then in a similar, but simpler ceremony at the same service, the Queen Consort will also be crowned. (Parish Pump)





He can speak Welsh. He spent two months learning the language in 1969, as he prepared to become the Prince of Wales. He still speaks it today.

He is a qualified pilot and diver. While serving in the military in the 1970s, he trained as a jet and helicopter pilot and became a confident diver.

He is a keen watercolour painter, a published author, and a music lover, who played the cello at Cambridge.

As Prince of Wales, he founded nearly 20 charities. They raise £140million each year. PP

Colossians 1: 9b-20 NRSVA

We have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, ¹⁰ so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. ¹¹ May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³ He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

The Supremacy of Christ

¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷ He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹ For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰ and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

There will be opportunity to speak with one of the prayer guides during the day if this is something you would like to do.


Both Pauline and Debbie, our facilitators, are part of the Breathing Space team, who are a group of ecumenical spiritual directors facilitating this day.

To see the beginning of my spiritual life, I would have to take you to a Salvation Army Hall in South London where, as a nine-year-old, when asked the question, 'Do you want Jesus to come into your heart'? I replied 'Yes' and that has made all the difference.

I would like to share with you, a Guiding refrain, sung in the mornings at camp, or wherever we join together for prayers.

'God has created a new day, silver and green and gold. Live that the sunset may find us, worthy His gift to hold.'

THE COURSE OF LIFE -

A EULOGY for My Beloved Father, Ronald William Bath (11 Apr 23)

Good morning, ladies, Gentlemen, my family and friends. Diane, Deborah, Stephen (who sadly cannot be here in person today) and I thank you all for attending today to celebrate the life of Ron Bath.

Context – When asked to provide a Eulogy for your father it is hard enough to include all the memories you have of his life, but for a father like mine who meant so much to so many people, I have found this task almost impossible. So, I hope you can bear with me as I endeavour with the words of my brother and the love of my sister to do justice in just a few fleeting moments to my Father Ronald William Bath.

My Brother is an employment counsellor who works with CV's. If you will indulge him in a Latin translation for Curriculum Vitae it comes out as the "course of life". This seems quite an appropriate format to follow the life of Ron in the way we have seen and experienced it with him.



On September 9, 1934 Ronald William Bath entered this world as the youngest son to Lily and Vincent, brother to John. His affinity to football and the church was set pretty early on. Attending Chelsea and Fulham games with his dad and his elder brother John (they lived in

Putney) and attending church where I am pretty sure his mother Lily was one of the leading lights.

Prior to my brother's entry into the world in 1961, Ron joined the RAF at the age of 16 in 1950. He often told us about his part on 2 June 1953 parading for the Queens Coronation, he was rightly proud to say he was there. My mother also tells a story of a dashing Airmen visiting her while she attended 6th Form turning the heads of the young ladies as he went. This was the beginning of his adventure with the love of his life, the first Chapter being completed on May 24, 1958 when he married Diane. In 1960 they moved to Kenya where in 1961 their first child, my big brother, was born. After returning to England, two more children followed, my big Sister Debbie and on a fateful day in 1966 yours truly.

In the early 1970's the Bath family moved to Cyprus. (Living in Limassol and RAF Akrotiri) There we formed part of another new community with church and the service families around us. Dad was always a keen sportsman, an accomplished Middle-Distance runner he also played football, cricket and rugby, and all of us children have recollections of watching dad perform. In Cyprus we got to see him play cricket, football and rugby with his unit team. Dad has always had a great love for sports which has rubbed off on his children, and all of his children chatted sports with him. He was even kind to the Liverpool supporters in the family!

In the mid 70's we found our way to RAF Odiham, a new adventure for work and his growing family. His ongoing dedication to community and scouting in particular was recognised in the Queen's honours list and he received the British Empire Medal (BEM). This was a reward that was richly deserved and a moment of great pride for all of us in recognition of a life of service.

Ron's RAF Career and his friends brought him to travel many parts of the world. He was certainly a well-travelled man. From the very beginning I can tell you that I can remember my dad as an honest, loyal, authentic and modest individual. He always represented his attributes with a kind, gentle and thoughtful demeanour. I don't recall him needing to raise his voice or to threaten to get things done. What a truly great role model to have.

Ron and Diane moved one last time in the late 70's to Basingstoke, Cedar Way to be precise. This is where they anchored their lives and for well over 40 years have been core members of the Trinity community. Even after retirement dad was never one to just sit back, he was always involved in projects. The one story I will share is the horror of his children when in his 70's (perhaps 80's) he continued to climb the ladder and clear the church gutters. He really was invincible in his own way, the stewardship and fellowship that he had was so very important to him.

It would be remiss of me not to mention some of his hobbies and interests. There were so many so we will start with the love of gardening. He always maintained a garden and a greenhouse; he ensured all his friends had tomato plants and any bulbs or seeds they needed. Our garden was always blooming.

His most intriguing and almost counter intuitive hobby to me was wine making. Dad came from a tea total background and did not drink very often but our linen closet and shoe cupboard sure was a fermenting and cellar option. He loved to experiment with his wines and share them with his friends, his peach wine really was not easy to forget. (Particularly the next morning). This was another example of his ability to bring joy to others, which he certainly did.

Dad loved trains, he even had LP's (if you know what they are) of train sounds that he played while making his detailed models (buildings, soldiers, planes, boats). Ron had a love of stamps and coins and started collecting in his teens, he shared this love with his children and grandchildren. Talking of grandchildren, Ron has 10 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren. A regret I think all his children will have is that some of our grandchildren will not have the opportunity to meet Pop, Opa or Grandad. He will, however, be alive in our memories, pictures and recollections.

Several years ago, my brother had an opportunity to visit for a few weeks with mum and dad. He was reminded how little my parents had changed over time. Dad never cared much for TV, he had a few shows that he introduced him too. Steve is now a big fan of the Repair Shop and Jay Blades. He also brought him up to speed on all the rugby and cricket he had missed. Including all of the ladies' teams that he also followed avidly.

The thread of our family brings me to the final notes in the course of this great life. I have witnessed what it meant to be a great husband, my father loved and showed his love daily to his wife. They truly loved each other and this will always be the place where we can bring our sadness to joy. The finality of this is summed up in this verse by **WH Auden:**

'He was my north, my south, my east and west, My working week my Sunday rest My noon, my midnight, my talk, my song I thought that love would last forever..."

He was not wrong!

Thank you all for allowing me to share these memories and insights.

In the words of Dame Vera: "We'll meet again, I don't know where, I don't know when. But I know we'll meet again some sunny Day."

Finally, I have been asked by my sister to finish with a Poem that she has chosen.

If Ron was there, things were better. It wasn't that he was a mover and a shaker or the focus of attention. Just the opposite. Sat, perhaps, in a corner, people somehow gravitated towards him, towards that slow but steady smile, and the eyes that smiled as well. He somehow had a quiet but profound presence which made things better. We have all known folk who by their presence were disruptive or spiky – we smile at them, wish them good evening or whatever, and move on. No hurry away from Ron though, he was just good to be with.

And when you talked with him (and that was never a chore) he gave you his attention. You were the focus and as far as Ron was concerned; you were important. I can envisage him as a Warrant Officer having to have a word, as they say, with some airman who had (how shall I put it?) fallen short in some duty. I am certain that that errant airman would have known quite clearly what his WO had said but would also have known – or even learned for the first time – that he mattered. Ron helped us to know that we mattered, we had worth. That's how he saw us. When he was talking with you he was talking with you.

And Ron was a grateful man. He looked out of those eyes of his and he saw things as they were but he was ever grateful for what he had and knew, for Di and his family, and for those of us who were his friends, and for what he had been enabled to do and be with and in his life. In his book "The Use of Praying" Neville Ward said that thankfulness was the heart of Christianity. He could have said that it was the heart of true humanity. That's what we found in Ron. He did us good by being there, by valuing us, telling us by attitude and presence that we mattered, and by his gratitude. There are folk who seem to suck lemons as a daily diet. Not Ron. And even when life had a bitter taste he cherished the good and the hopeful and made you feel at home with him.

So, God bless you, Ron, from those who you blessed by being who you were.

Eulogy for Katherine Mary Kelly (Kim)

Kim was born Katherine Mary, to Frederick and May Eckstein on 4th October 1929, in Penzance. She was their only child. Her father had been working as a telephone engineer in Spain and he and May decided that their child should be born in England, so they returned to the U.K. As Katherine's initials were KME, she became affectionately known to her family as "Kimmie", which then became Kim, as we all knew her. Later, the family moved to South Harrow, London, where Kim's father continued his work as a telephone engineer.



With the onset of the Second World War, they moved to North Waltham, with Fred working in London during the week, coming home at weekends to be with his wife and daughter. Kim attended the girls' High School in Basingstoke and it was on the bus to school that she met her future husband Frank, who attended the boys' grammar school. Kim left school after sitting her Higher School Certificate, where she excelled at zoology and chemistry. Her early working life included positions at a research establishment in Reading, and at Portals in Overton.

It was never easy to refuse Kim so even though I said I couldn't bake cakes that people would pay good money for, I offered to run the cake stall. Well, long story short, thanks to Kim I found myself travelling to Romania the next week. When I returned, of course Kim wanted to know all about it and invited me to North Waltham Methodist Chapel to talk about my trip at their harvest service.

Kim didn't stop at that and I soon became a regular member of the small but select congregation and also attended the Alpha course, twice. Kim became like a spiritual mentor to me and not only a neighbour, but a very good friend.

Kim was an amazing woman and the most committed Christian I have ever met. To be still preaching the gospel at 93 years of age is truly remarkable. She touched the lives of many people and I know that I am just one. I think Kim's God given gift was her solid and unshakeable faith and her constant capacity to encourage people.

I am sure that all who knew Kim will be sure where she is now.

Below is a resume of what I said at Kim's funeral. They may not be in the order I said them and there are also some recollections that I have included that were not in the original tribute.

It is a privilege to give this tribute to Kim. First of all she would have been so thrilled to see so many of you gathered here today and with the church full. I first met Kim many years ago when we worshipped at Immanuel, Hatch Warren. We hit it off from the beginning. Kim was so full of life and was always seeing the Holy spirit at work in so many ways. We had some happy times together. Kim would often phone up and say so and so is preaching somewhere, do you want to come? And we went all over the Portsmouth, Fareham area.

When I felt the call to put myself forward for local preacher training I mentioned it to Kim. She immediately praised the Lord and said, right we need to get you started. We were due to go to North Warnborough that afternoon and she collared our minister so I didn't have a chance to get out of it even if I wanted to. Kim was a tremendous support during my training. If she felt I was being harshly judged at the local preachers meeting she would tell them so. When eventually I finished my training it was a privilege to have Kim preach the sermon at my accreditation service.

After some years at Hatch Warren I felt the time was right to move on. I mentioned it to Kim and unknown to each other we both felt the same. We felt led to St Andrews but had no idea what God had in mind for us to do.

Kim was due to preach at St Andrews so she suggested I came along as well and at the

end of the service we would tell them. The end of the service came and we duly stood at the front and told the congregation how we felt God was leading us to this place. There was a split second silence when you think what have we done, have we made a terrible mistake. Then out of the pews came Audrey Wiles who welcomed us both with the hand of friendship. From that moment on we both felt very loved and welcomed by St Andrews folk. Kim was always excited about what was going on at St Andrews and was a wonderful support in so many ways. I remember dancing around the church when we were both a bit more agile. She was always so full of life.

At the back of the Church you will see on the display a selection of flags. These Kim made herself and were used at various services. We thank her family for allowing us to keep them as it will always be a reminder of Kim when they are used. I took them to Boys Brigade camp last year and Kim was thrilled that the young people were using them. The flags also came to Torquay each year to the MET conference at the end of January when they would be waved with gusto at the Saturday evening get together. Kim was able to go this year and she came back buzzing because it had been such a good time.

Farewell dear Kim. Thank you for your friendship and support. I will miss you.

This was a surprise to me as most of us in our early 70's are well into retirement and not embarking on a new career. Not so with Kim, she had been guided by the Holy Spirit who had called her to Preach, and Kim empowered by the Spirit took it on and made a success of it. She was still preaching in fact in February this year. My wife, Llyn, remembers Kim in the old St Andrews Church at a Boys Brigade Parade service demonstrating how to swim by lying across a chair and waving her arms and legs. Interaction with the congregation across all age groups was very important in her preaching outreach.

Kim was also actively involved in Church activities, and a regular member of the St Andrew's Song Group.

Age was no barrier to her and living in the lovely rural village of Bradley she was driving her car well into last year giving her the mobility she needed to enjoy the rural life and to relax in her lovely wild garden, and also to be active in Basingstoke Church life. In fact, she did not give up driving, rather it was her car that gave up on her, and went into retirement!

I came to know Kim well during the last six months or so, when I drove her home to Bradley to her country cottage after church. She loved her wild garden and would show me the new colourful Spring life in the trees, plants and flowers regenerating there, God's Creation, nurtured and loved by Kim.

I have no doubt whatsoever that Kim is now with our Loving Lord in His Heavenly Creation, a fitting reward for a wonderful lady devoted to loving and serving Him. Rest in Peace Kim.

When I first met Kim, she had a spring in her step. She was a bubbly chatty personality. We developed a rapport straight away. Kim was very easy to converse with, and chatting with her was always a delight. The Bible study / prayer time was always more alive when Kim was present. She was always ready to share, pray, and encourage. It didn't matter whether it was just Kim and me, we would still use up the hour and even go over the time. We never ran out of things to talk about or pray about; and the conversation was always God-centered. The way Kim prayed so spontaneously, reminded me of my mum, she just seemed to have had the right words to articulate her prayers, no matter what she was praying about.

One day in late September, Kim called me and said that she was thinking about what she could do to be of some help to the church, and said that she wanted to have a go at being the safeguarding officer. We had a chat about it and she said "I will give it a go", and, at the age of 93, she became the Safeguarding Officer of St Andrew's Methodist Church. Although she had to step back from the role a few months in, it showed her willingness to do what she can to assist the church with her gifts and graces.

For a long time, Kim wanted me to visit her in Bradley. In late January, she called me and told me that Martin Frost was planning to come to see her and to ask him to bring me along. On 9th February Martin and I visited her and it was such a delight to see her at home. As always, we had a wonderful time chatting together. She took us out into the garden, showed us around, and took us to the pond to see if we can spot any frogs. Her love for the natural world was so vivid: in fact, when we arrived, she was in the garden feeding the birds. I loved chatting with her and always had a good laugh.

Kim was incredibly open, she embraced change, and she was so positive about the ongoing conversations between St Andrew's and Trinity. She is a good example of how to age gracefully and godly.
