

Dear Friends

God's Ravens still fly!

One of the best things about holidays is the chance to read something, actually give it your attention and enjoy it.

Recently I spent a really lovely week with family on Guernsey and was given and read a book with the title of this article. The story of Elijah and the ravens may be very familiar to you but I confess that I often neglect the Old Testament in favour of the more modern parts of the Bible, so the story and its message is one I want to share with you.

In case you want to read it for yourself, you can find the story in *1 Kings Chapter 17* and briefly it is this:-

The Israelites and their Kings were busy trying out other gods than Jehovah and were living lives miles from the rules God had given them.

Elijah, God's prophet, had already warned King Ahab and his wife Jezebel about their allegiance to Baal and their wicked ways. He gave the king the clear message that only the God of Israel was entitled to be worshiped as a divinity. He warned Ahab that God was going to send a three year drought as punishment for his disobedience and wicked deeds. Following God's instructions, Elijah left the kingdom and crossed the Jordan to hide in the Kerith ravine in the desert. (Ahab's men were looking to kill him for speaking out against the King's behaviour).

God promised that during the drought and famine, while he was hiding from Ahab's men, ravens would bring Elijah bread and meat every morning and evening and the brook Kerith would provide water. We don't know how long Elijah stayed in hiding but God was true to his promise and the birds provided him with all that he needed to survive.

Eventually, because of the drought the brook dried up and God told Elijah to go to Sidon and ask a widow there to give him something to eat. Widows in Jewish society were often in a precarious position, without a husband or male relative to look after them. This widow was gathering firewood for cooking when Elijah met her, as God had promised.

Elijah asked the widow for bread just when she and her son were down to their last rations of oil and meal. However, he promised her that if she brought him a piece of bread "the jar of flour will not run out and the bottle of oil will not become empty before God sends rain on the land and ends the drought."

Throughout the rest of the famine and drought God kept to his promise and provided for Elijah, the widow and her son by replenishing their flour and oil with just enough for each day.

Surprisingly this story only formed the introduction in the book I read, but the message was amazingly clear and really relevant to the situations so many Christians find themselves in today. The main part of the book recounted the stories of Christians who felt that God was calling them to help Jewish people in Russia and Eastern Europe to hear the Gospel and to receive parcels of food, clothes, medicines and other goods that they were lacking. The "ravens" in the account are those amazing people who provided huge quantities of goods and the means to transport them to Jewish people and Christian churches in need. God's faithful hand inspiring huge donations of food and medicine and making it possible to deal with tricky border crossings and other bureaucracy is evidence that modern miracles still happen.

Just like Elijah we may find ourselves in difficult places or even being victimised for our faith but Bible stories remind us that there is nowhere that God's practical

help and his grace cannot reach us. God didn't provide Elijah with more than his physical needs but he sent him to an unlikely woman whose own rations were meager but who was willing to help a stranger out and to welcome him into her home.

I have been reminded by reading Elijah's story that today we may not have feathered ravens to bring our breakfast and supper but those who, prompted by God's spirit, do what he commands are his "ravens" of the everyday. We may not all be sent to beg bread from widows but I am sure that, like me, you have been fed, welcomed and supported by people who perhaps had very little money or goods of their own to share with others. Such people, by their generous actions are messengers of God's love and care for each one of us.

Let's recognise God's ravens even when they don't have beaks or feathers and give Him (and them) our thanks.

GO TO THE SILCHESTER RETREAT DAY? - WHO ME?

"It's not really my thing" you say or "How on earth am I going to get to Silchester?" or "I can't do things in front of others".



For me it was the first reason. I didn't think it was something that I would particularly enjoy.

Anyway, I went to my first one, after some persuasion and found it quite laid back and plenty of different activities to try to suit all tastes.

So, I went to my second one at the end of September. In the morning after a short worship time and an introduction to the theme of the day which was, "A Glimpse of Glory", we were given a whole range of things that we could do if we wished which included going out into the garden around the church or going for a longer walk in the beautiful countryside around the church. There were a lot of indoor things to choose from as well, or you could do nothing at all if you wished. I chose the walk with 5 or 6 others and really enjoyed it. It was a beautiful, sunny morning. Not only that, in the lovely scenery we could see glimpses of God's Glory in the insects, flowers and trees that were there.

On returning, there was still time to do something else before lunch if we wanted to or not if we didn't want to. There is a lounge if you want to sit and read or just think about things.

During the opening worship time when we were introduced to the theme, an idea came to me. I can sometimes glimpse either visually or verbally, God's Glory, in beautiful flowers or music and wondered how I could portray these in a picture. Then an idea came to me. I could try to draw a picture of a vase of flowers but instead of having ordinary flowers in the vase, have the flower heads made out of musical symbols. So, I did that and while I was doing it the words of the hymn came to me, 'Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken' and that seemed to me to be most appropriate in which to frame the picture.

Do not feel you have to show others what you have done if you don't want to. You are doing these things for yourself (and God) in a way that you choose, or following the theme of the day. It is an opportunity to try things out for yourself. You may even find a new pastime that you enjoy. You can try all or none of the options available it is up to you. You also have "permission" to do nothing......just be.....wait for God to lead, to speak to you and put ideas into your head as He did me.

There was a short worship time when the theme was reviewed after which we left for home about mid-afternoon.

Why not give it a try? You might surprise yourself and actually enjoy it.





Eulogy – Joan Evelyn Lawes

I would like to thank you all for coming today to celebrate the life of Joan Lawes, my Mum, Grandma to Matt and Greg and Great Grandma to Frank.

I'm a little nervous, I've always avoided public speaking since my days at secondary school when we were set an assignment to stand up and speak to the rest of the class for 5 minutes on a subject set by the teacher that I can't even remember now, but it terrified the life out of me, and here I am almost 50 years later!

Mum was born in Woking on 25 August 1930 to Frank and Norah Tate, she had no brothers or sisters but she adored her little cousin John and they spent a lot of time together, especially during the war years. They always kept in touch. They had a bit of a love/hate relationship and loved winding each other up but they were very fond of one another.

Mum didn't travel much as a child or young adult but she did spend some time in Holland looking after 2 little girls which she always remembered fondly. She'd met my Dad by that time and they wrote affectionately to one another. Jackie asked me how Mum and Dad met and I honestly don't know, sadly its questions like that that you realise you'll now never know the answer to.

Mum and Dad married in 1955 and they set about building the bungalow at Winchester Road. Dad had started his own Electrical Business and Mum's role was answering the phone and keeping the paperwork in order – something she was very methodical about. I came along in 1962 and I'd like to think I bought them great joy!! Mum's favourite role was housewife, she enjoyed harvesting all Dad's labours from the garden and pickling, freezing, jam making, stewing etc. There was never any waste food, which probably stemmed back to the war rationing. Whilst Dad grew the veg, Mum grew the flowers and they both used to love visiting gardens and were active members of Preston Candover Gardening Club.

Because Dad found it difficult to take time away from the business they always made sure that I had holidays either by going "On Camp" with the Girls Brigade or by staying with my Aunty Ivy and Uncle Bill in Kent, I loved those holidays and Mum and Dad would stay for the weekend when it was time to come home.

I do remember one year we went to Weymouth for a holiday, I was probably 7 or 8 years old, we stayed in a hotel which I thought was very posh because we'd never stayed in one before. They took me to the beach and we went for walks every day, the drive there seemed to take forever in the Morris 1300, I wish we had that car now, or more to the point Robert and Matt would.

I left home in the 1980's and Dad no longer employed anybody so they were both able to enjoy holidays in Jersey and Guernsey amongst other places.

Matt was born in June 1992 and both Mum and Dad were over the moon. Sadly Dad passed away 3 months later. Mum spent a lot of time with us where she thoroughly enjoyed spending time with Matt. 17 months later Greg came along, he was a much easier baby to look after but the 2 of them together were a bit of a handful. When I told Mum that we were considering having another baby because I really wanted a girl Mum point blank threatened

to leave town. Thinking about it I'm not sure where she would have gone because all her friends were in Basingstoke and she loved it here.

Mum enjoyed going on coaching holidays around the UK with her friends, I think she loved Scotland the best until the journey became too tedious. Mum went with several friends and they always had a great time. Mum also enjoyed her trips to Carlisle to visit John and Sheila. The last visit she made was with me and Matt, we flew up there as she wasn't so good on her feet and Matt was always right beside her when we went out and when needed he was right behind her when she convinced herself she was going to fall over or her knees were going to give way – which they did!

Mum always enjoyed the camaraderie of her ladies meetings including Trinity Circle and Towns Women's Guild. She spent many happy times at the meetings, the lunches and outings with these groups including seeing Muriel and Irene.

Mum's weekly treat was having her hair done and this task has been completed by Sharon for the last 40 years, obviously during that time they have become good friends as have Sharon and I. Sharon and her family have been invaluable to me in helping look after Mum in recent years and I would like to thank them from the bottom of my heart.

Mum and Dad have always been Methodists and they both had a very active involvement at Trinity Methodist Church. I remember going to the 1st Service there when it opened on 30th May 1970 and its with great sadness that the final service was on Sunday 27 August 2023. I didn't have the heart to tell Mum it was closing, I know she wouldn't have remembered but it would have still upset her.

Hazel Harris reminded me recently of all the Christmas crackers Mum made for the Church Bazaar every year. Our lounge would be covered in toilet roll centres, crepe paper, bangers, motto's and tiny gifts for months. My job was to cut about ½" off all the toilet roll centre's because they were slightly too big as standard. I never graduated to a fully-fledged cracker maker, that was always Mum's department and she loved it. Barbara too sent me a card sharing her fond memories of making crackers, they had such a laugh, so much so that they were put in a separate room for making too much noise at the Church.

Sheila also reminded me recently that Mum used to make crackers for the family and would send a box up to Scotland every Christmas and the children loved them, I remember Mum labelling them so everyone got the correct gift.

Mum loved most crafts, I've inherited that skill from her. She was a fantastic knitter and she also enjoyed crocheting. She was always asking people for any leftover balls of wool and she'd make them into blankets which were then taken out to Romania by her friends Pat and Vic for the orphaned children out there. I said earlier that Greg was an easy baby to look after, as he grew he became more confident and its that confidence that's taken him to Australia where he's joined us via the

video link. Greg used to love playing tricks on his Grandma or just generally winding her up, his most annoying trait was talking too fast and despite wearing her hearing aid Mum still struggled to understand what Greg was saying and he knew it. He would also say things that she didn't understand, with that in mind I asked Greg if he would like to say anything and his response was "Rest Easy J Dizzle" – yeah I don't know what he means either. Mum's reply would be a short sharp "oh talk sense" and more recently "I don't know what he's talking about".

Memories from Matt, these are Matt's words and he's asked me to speak on his behalf:

"This is hard for me even if it had been coming, I'm struggling to put into words how this makes me feel but I love you Grandma and I'm already missing you more than you would know. I have so many memories especially from being a nipper and having sleep overs at yours. The times Greg and I used to play cricket in the back garden and you'd tell us to be careful then about 2 minutes later a tennis ball would go through the greenhouse!

I'm so glad I got to say goodbye to you and I'll always have my memories with you to cherish. You've been an idol to me and I'll miss you greatly as will Greg!

Love you always Grandma".

Turkey-Syria Earthquake Appeal: Christian Aid thanks supporters

Eight months on from the devastating earthquakes that killed at least 58,000 people across southern Turkey and northwest Syria, Christian Aid has thanked the generosity of their supporters for raising over £3.4m to help "tens of thousands of people who lost their homes, livelihoods and loved ones."

Since the deadly earthquakes on 6th February, the first of which struck in the early hours of the morning when many people were asleep and destroyed thousands of buildings, survivors have faced torrential rains and flooding and then the extreme summer heat affecting much of southern Europe.

In northwest Syria, working through local partners and with funding from several donors, Christian Aid has been able to reach more than 60,000 people badly impacted by the earthquake and another 5,000 people in Southern Turkey.

Chaplaincy Prayer Letter September 2023

Greetings - as we move into autumn, but have weather appropriate to the height of summer... It is a 'new start' season with schools back and church activities restarting in full. There is renewed enthusiasm and excitement. Chaplains have been busy throughout the summer and have had a surprising number of conversations on spiritual matters in the Courts, shops and on the streets. They have been able to bring God, with His love and grace, into some difficult situations that people face. Some people have gone on to seek Him in their local churches.

A verse from Isaiah is an encouragement:

... lift up your voice and shout, lift it up, do not be afraid; say to the towns of Judah, 'Here is your God!'

The whole Bible is the story of God's mission to draw people back to Himself and we all have a small part in that mission. We can invite people into our communities and we can also go out to meet people in Basingstoke who would not otherwise consider coming to a church or expect to feel welcome there. We can surprise them with God's love and welcome!

Thank you for your support in this ministry. Your prayers are precious to us and we do see them answered, as we meet people and seem to be given the right words to say to encourage and support them. Some people we meet regularly, others are by God's one-off **contact.**

Work at the Courts continues three mornings a week and we now support the monthly Living with Loss Café at the Discovery Centre. We are also looking to facilitate more Christian presence in the town centre at Christmas, and value your prayers for that – for what is appropriate and possible, and for sufficient support from church groups to make it happen.

Sadly, the loss of Malcolm Read this summer has impacted us in several ways. His enthusiasm and commitment inspired us and he had built up a good relationship with staff at the bus station and Top of Town. Other Chaplains, too, have family concerns

that are restricting or stopping them serve at present. So we are keen to welcome anyone who feels they may be called to this ministry, to go round with a Chaplain to see first-hand what we do. If you would like to learn more about how Chaplaincy works, and what different roles there are we would love to hear from you. Of you could suggest it to someone who gets on well with people and may be suitable.

Can we be invited to your church? We are ready to visit any church to explain what we do; as we get to know you we can confidently refer people to your church, knowing they will receive a good welcome.

As we all seek to witness to God's grace and love may we support one another in all the ways we can.

Resolving crises, Helping those in need

Welcome to our summer update! We are as busy as ever here at the Foodbank, with the rising cost of living impacting many in our community, as well as school holidays causing increased costs for many families.



Foodbank News

Welcome Ruth - Our New Operations Manager



Ruth joined us on 12 June as our new Operations Manager. You may see her at head office or out at our centres as she manages the day to day running of the Foodbank.

Ruth was formally a community mental health nurse, but has spent the last year working in the admin office at St. Mary's Church Eastrop. She brings lots to the team with her experience of supporting people with mental health challenges, and we're already benefiting from her social media and IT skills.. so good to have a 'younger person' join the team!

Gearing up for Harvest

It is that time of year again when we begin to think about our harvest donations. Last year we were delighted and overwhelmed by the generosity of our local pre-schools, schools and colleges who donated over 6.6 tonnes of food during the season, as well as the generosity of churches, social groups, businesses and individuals. These donations went to supporting the 7000 people who we fed last year.

This year, we are seeing the impact of the cost-of-living crisis in our 7 centres with an increase in demand of 31% in the first 6 months of 2023, and know that this is impacting many families. We have therefore called our schools' harvest 'Bring a tin' so that everyone can participate without feeling pressured to send several items to school or college.

Over the school summer holidays we will be getting our Schools Team together so that in September they are ready to visit school assemblies to let the children know what we do and why.

Updates

School Holiday Meals

We are aware that for some families, school holidays can be a particular strain on the finances. This may be due to loss of the free school meals during this period but there are often also additional costs of child-care or of occupying children for six weeks. To support these families, we have partnered with local schools and colleges in Basingstoke and Tadley and encourage them to refer any families who will be struggling to feed their children during this time. We offer fortnightly food parcels over the holidays which provides meals for the whole family for three days as well as toiletries and other household basics. This should significantly help with weekly shopping costs. By dropping into our centres to collect their food, these families also have a chance to confirm their food choices, speak with our volunteers about other support available and use the Citizen's Advice drop-in.

Rough Sleepers Food Packs

Working together with Julian House Homeless Outreach Team and the Camrose Centre, we provide food packs for those sleeping rough in Basingstoke. These packs are small and light enough to be carried in one bag, but contain enough food for a whole day. We ensure everything into these packs can be used without any form of cooking facilities, while also offering variety and nutrition.

Introducing a Foodbank Centre – Brighton Hill

Our Brighton Hill Centre is located in Basingstoke Baptist Church and open on a Wednesday Morning 10.30 am – 12.30 pm. It is run by our team of volunteers, Marily, Krevin, Sue, Iris, Paul, Pat, Vanessa and Elizabeth. The Team describe themselves as a friendly group who like a laugh and a dance! They enjoy spending time together outside of Foodbank, and often do this by visiting The Café Dome, a community café located in Brighton Hill. When asked what they enjoy about being part of the Foodbank, one of the volunteers said "I really love it when we meet someone for the first time and can put them at ease so they leave feeling better than when they arrived".

Both CAP Debt Coaches and Money Lifeline Advisors offer independent, non-judgemental, support. They work with their clients to sort and organise debts, create an affordable payment plan, deal with creditors on their client's behalf and continue to support them until they are debt free. Little by Little does Very Nicely (PP)

We've all heard the hype about the need to do 10,000 steps a day, to stay fit. But recent studies have found that even just walking 4,500 steps a day can bring significant health benefits. It seems that, compared to adults who take less than 2,000 steps a day, people who take 4,500 steps a day are 77 per cent less likely to have a cardiovascular problem in the following three years. And it also seems that, no matter what you are currently walking, even just adding 500 steps a day to your distance can bring you significant health benefits. "We were surprised to find that every additional quarter of a mile, or 500 steps, of walking had such a strong benefit to heart health," says Dr Erin Dooley, an assistant professor of epidemiology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham School of Public Health. "While we do not want to diminish the importance of higher intensity physical activity, encouraging small increases in the number of daily steps also has significant cardiovascular benefits.

Canon Paul Hardingham considers why Christians put such a high value on the Bible. Bible Sunday is on the 29 October (PP)

At the recent Coronation the King was given a Bible with the words 'the most valuable thing that this world affords'. As Bible Sunday is celebrated this month, let's ask why we should read the Bible? The Bible isn't a single book, but a library of 66 books, composed by some 44 writers over 1500 years in a range of styles including history, poetry, prophecy, letters and apocalyptic (looking at the end times). Despite having a number of different writers, it claims one authority – God Himself! 'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (2 Timothy 3:16). The Bible is inspired ('the word of God in the words of men') and equips us to live for God in every aspect of our lives. We also have the promise of the Holy Spirit to guide us when we read: 'when the Spirit of truth comes, He will guide you into all truth' (John 16:13). How should we read the Bible? Let's consider these guidelines:

Right time: We need a regular routine, which will meet our needs. This will vary according to our circumstances: e.g. a mum at home with young children, somebody with a demanding job or a retired person.

Right Place: We need to find a space where we can be undisturbed (e.g. lounge, bedroom, train or kitchen).

Right Version: We need a version of the Bible which we can readily understand and use. A number of versions are available (e.g. NIV, The Message), as well as Bible apps we can access on our phone.

Right Help: Reading notes also help us to understand a passage and apply it to our lives. Let's get reading!!
