#### Dear Friends

This is my first time in writing this pastoral letter for our newsletter which brings up some initial challenges as to whom it is being addressed to?

If you are reading this as a person with little or no church experience, then perhaps I should start by welcoming you. We are standing at the beginning of another new Year, following on from our annual celebration of Christmas, but for many people the latter is mainly an expensive and very commercial experience, rather than a holy and spiritual recognition of God (the Father) intervening in human affairs with the birth of the Christ child, sent to open the way for all people to re-enter the relationship that God intended for us all – to become children of God.

Please come and join us in church on any Sunday if you would like to explore more of that true meaning of Christmas (Christ with us!).

If, like me, you are reading this letter as an established Christian believer, though maybe a little tarnished and not 'shining' as much as perhaps you did in earlier years of that relationship, then you are equally welcome here!

Our Christian journey has been well described in John Bunyan's story of Pilgrim's Progress, where the main subject travels along many different and often difficult highways and byways, all with the constant temptation of an 'easier path' being offered in some of the more difficult terrain!

For ourselves, then I would like to share some thoughts on the times in which we find ourselves living!

None of us can fail to recognise the very many difficult situations that are happening

around our world. The ongoing conflict / war in Ukraine with the occupation of large areas of the country by Russian forces. The devastation being inflicted on innocent men, women & children in Gaza and the ever-increasing risk this presents to world peace as other Muslim countries witness what is happening and seek to intervene! Other seemingly forgotten conflicts and situations such as that in Myanmar, Yemen, Sudan, and other parts of Africa and Asia with drought, famine, floods as well as how minorities are being ill-treated creating vet more refugees.

As Christians, this should not come as any great surprise, as Jesus himself spoke of such things happening as signs of the end of the age!

The question that we need to ask of ourselves is 'What is it that I can do?'

There are potentially many different answers to that question but I would like to make a suggestion that is available to every one of us!

#### We can pray!

Prayer is our weapon of choice as Christians.

With prayer, we can hold people, situations, even countries up to the heart of God the Father.

Prayer is more than an activity – yes, we can engage in regular times of prayer, we can use formal or informal types of prayer, but it is much more than an activity!

Prayer is a life-style, it is an attitude, and it is powerful!

Prayer is not confined to being used in church – you can and should pray anywhere and at any time! Walking down the street, in the shops or the bath, out in the countryside, among crowds!

Often, we forget the power and scope of prayer and use it only to ask for a particular outcome to a life situation but again I would remind you that it is more than that.

We can use prayer to oppose evil in our world, to bind those who destroy life and who bring darkness into the lives of so many.

Yes, we can pray for... but we can also pray against... We can intervene in situations by invoking prayer to influence their direction, by focussing the power of God in the Spirit on individuals, groups, towns, cities, countries...

And finally, yes, we can pray for ourselves too – that we would be strengthened, empowered for good, employed by God as agents of change! Just think of how much difference that could make if we use prayer in our everyday lives during 2024 and beyond, and expand the scope of our prayers too!



# 'One Life'

#### 'I cannot unsee what I have seen'

After a visit to Prague, capital of Czechoslovakia, and seeing the plight of refugees, particularly the children, fleeing from Nazi persecution, during WW2, Nicholas Winton knew he had to do something.

He said, 'I cannot do everything, but I can do something, and I must.' He went on to rescue, over 600 children, from certain death.

This is the subject of the film 'One Life', which I saw recently.

Nicholas Winton, the son of German Jewish parents, was an agnostic. A stockbroker by profession and essentially a humanitarian.

He set up a chain of people, who made it possible for children, to be evacuated to the UK, where people took them in, and sheltered them.

In 1948 after the war, his Danish wife found in the attic of their home, a scrapbook, full of photographs and names of the children.

When asked, 'Is this a secret,' Nicholas replied, 'No, I just did not talk about it'. As a result of his humanitarian action, many people are alive today.

The scrapbook is now in the Holocaust Museum in Jerusalem.

We never know how much our lives have helped other people. Have we met Jesus? if through the power of the Holy Spirit we have, we can never forget, nor undo that experience, it remains with us.

Thank God for people like Nicholas Winton.

# A Good Night's Sleep

People ask me how is it that I get a good night's sleep every night?

I refuse to worry about anything and go to bed carefree.

Before I came to Basingstoke I was assistant cashier in a Trawler company on Grimsby docks. I think it is generally known that the crew of the trawlers are paid their money worked out on the sale of the fish. When a ship landed (most days) I could not do a lot beforehand but when I was told by our salesmen what the fish had sold for it was "all go".

The Skippers and Mates used to come into my office to wait for their money and they were not the quietest type of folk. This made it quite difficult for me to get on until I found that I could "switch off". This meant that I was not aware of anything that was happening in the office and indeed if someone spoke to me I would not hear him, this way I got on with my job which was to work out the money coming to the crew – there were 6 different rates in the crew, and everything I did had to be correct as there was no time to double check.

I can still do this "switch off" and it is very useful.

Can I recommend to you all that you try it.

Pick a room with a comfortable seat or bed in which you will not be interrupted, draw the curtains, switch off anything that makes a noise, sit or lie down and get comfortable and relax your entire body, close your eyes and think of nothing. The time is of your choosing but I advise at least 20 minutes.

I have found that after a session, any stress has gone, everything seems easier and I am at peace with all.

I go to bed just before midnight and take about 10 minutes to go to sleep and then go into a sound sleep for a minimum of 7 hours, I do not get up until 9.30 am.

Try it......It works for me.


# **Christian Musical April 2024**

# **Book of Jonah - Today's Message**

Following a recent sermon by our new minister Rev. Claire Simpson I was motivated to fully read the Book of Jonah, and to understand its message in today's world. We are all familiar from our Sunday School days with the story of Jonah being saved from the stormy seas by a whale, but the Book also has a very powerful message for us of obedience to God's calling, even when it puts us in conflict with our understanding of His teaching.

In Jonah's time he ran away from God's command for him to go to Ninevah, the capital city of the Assyrian Empire, to tell them that they were to be destroyed in 40 days for their wickedness. He did this as he believed that God was a loving, merciful and forgiving God for all mankind, and would never destroy His people. Eventually as we read on, we see Jonah after the whale incident, going to Ninevah in obedience to God's command, the Assyrians repenting of their wicked ways, and God forgiving them and not destroying them.

The Book finishes however with God giving a stern warning to Jonah, and indeed to ourselves, that we should give priority over our own needs to God's commands to us, even if it is uncomfortable or even dangerous for us. We should have faith that God will take care of us, and see us through these storms, indeed as He did in rescuing Jonah with the big fish (whale).

So what does the story of Jonah mean to us in today's World? What can we learn from it? We live in a World of escalating conflicts leading to warfare. We look at the ongoing conflict between Israel and Gaza, where the Palestinians are under the authority of Hamas. We can see a parallel here with the Assyrian Empire in Jonah's time. Hamas is an Islamic organisation dedicated to the formation of a wholly Palestinian state by means of jihad, armed military struggle by divine authority, and in doing so the annihilation of Israel. To achieve its objectives it has resorted to the deliberate murder, torture and kidnapping of innocent civilians. It is recognised by many countries in the United Nations as a terrorist organisation. Israel's response to this in self-defence is to take military action against Hamas, and to attempt to destroy it completely.

Hamas was founded in 1987 after the outbreak of the First Intifada against Israel over Israel's military occupation of Gaza and the West Bank. Hamas produced a charter in 1988 defining its mandate. This was revised in 2017 and is available online: <a href="https://www.middleeasteye.net/news/hamas-2017-document-full">https://www.middleeasteye.net/news/hamas-2017-document-full</a>

What we now have is armed conflict between two religions, Muslims and Jews, and a humanitarian crisis. This is not the solution that our Lord wants for His people. What we see in the Book of Jonah is the Assyrians recognising their misdeeds and repenting and seeking God's forgiveness, and God withdrawing his right to destroy them and allowing them to live in peace.

In the Gaza conflict there has been no repentance by Hamas, as they believe that their actions are in strict adherence to Allah's divine commandments, as sent down to prophet Mohamed in the Quran. The Jews for their part believe that they are God's chosen people as divinely defined in the Scriptures, and must maintain control of Israel and Jerusalem at all costs to receive the coming of the Messiah. History has taught us that ideologies can never be defeated by military action, the ideology itself must be shown and proved to be false.

Cont'd.....

The Book of Jonah gives us the answer to ceasing this conflict. We Christians must come out of our comfort zone and demand an immediate cease fire allowing humanitarian aid to be given to the innocent civilians caught up in the conflict. We should also, under the leadership of the highest authorities in the international Christian churches, be reaching out to the Hamas leadership and their followers in spreading the message of Repentance and Salvation through Jesus Christ. "Go and make disciples of all nations" Matthew 28:19. We should indeed be asking ourselves why was this not done earlier as the warning signs of this conflict were there from the time of the Intifadas in1987 when Hamas was founded? If we Christians had done so this present conflict might well have been averted, as was the case in Ninevah!

God told Jonah in Jonah Chapter 4 that it would not be easy to follow His commands, and that we should put aside our own desires and put our trust in Him.

Are we Christians up to this Challenge in Today's World?

# A few of my favourite things

#### **Old Testament verse**

I'm not a great fan of the Old Testament – too much revenge. Some would say that not a lot has changed in 3,000 years! If I had to pick a verse it would be from Psalm 8 (vv 3 & 4) "When I look at the heavens, the work of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars which Thou hast established; what is man that Thou art mindful of him, and the son of man that Thou dost care for him?"

#### **New Testament verse**

No contest: John 3, 16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life".

#### Hymn

I have three favourite hymns, all of which are slated for my funeral (just so's you know what to expect!): Charles Wesley's *Behold the servant of the Lord* set to the tune of the aria *Bei mannern* from *The Magic Flute* by W A Mozart. My musical hero, Ludwig van Beethoven, was so entranced by the tune that he wrote a wonderful set of variations for cello and piano based on it. And *Lord, for the years* by Timothy Dudley-Smith: it just says so much about the world we live in. And finally *What shall we offer our good Lord* by A G Spangenburg, translated by John Wesley. I prefer the version in MHB (784) – to *Duke Street,* of course – but I can see why it was cut by the compilers of *Hymns & Psalms* and *Singing the Faith*. Arguably, if John Wesley had not encountered the Moravians on his ill-fated mission to the colonies (ie USA!) in 1735 – and translated 33 hymns – we would not have the Methodist Church today.

#### Film / TV

I'm afraid that I rather like the vaguely irreverent, especially Dave Allen and Monty Python. The church should never be afraid of humour. But I love **Yes, Minister** and **Yes, Prime Minister**. As an ex-Civil Servant, they're not quite true to life but the plot lines are superb – even 40 years on they still reflect on the shape of things.

#### **Book**

My wife reads story books – lots of them: I read to learn things: particularly about railways and aircraft. I don't have a particular favourite but I did know Capt Eric Brown CBE, DSO, DFC, RN, often known as "Winkle" and sometimes called "Britain's greatest pilot". He wrote several books about the aircraft he flew (and their failings) and his own life story Wings on my sleeve, which is quite amazing.

#### Song

Well, not a song. I play the piano and the organ (not brilliantly) and I love Beethoven's Piano Sonatas – especially the *Waldstein Op 53* – stunning, but difficult!

#### Someone from history who inspires me

Well, actually, three people with something in common: Martin Luther, John Wesley and Ludwig van Beethoven. All of them had trials and tribulations in their lives – often from "higher authority" – but all found inner strength to carry on and fulfil God's promise in them.

We Yorkshire folk feel a kinship with that!

#### A place where I feel close to God

As far as I'm concerned, God is everywhere and not confined to places – sometimes churches least of all. Every week I put together an on-line "Wednesday Fellowship" for our Zoom on-line "Church of the Living Stream". I usually select three not very well-known hymns from *Singing the Faith* which we read antiphonally. The choice is very much "as the spirit moves" – but just sitting here and thinking about it all brings God closer.

#### An impressive faith building

I've only been once – on a guided tour – but the Mosque / Cathedral of Cordoba takes some beating. Just an amazing concatenation of the human response to God from Christians and Muslims over many centuries. If you haven't been, put it on the bucket list!

## A memorable journey

Well, my wife and I have been to many places but I was born in the last house in Settle (Yorkshire) on the way to Malham. To walk over the watershed between the Ribble and Aire valleys and see the superb landscape and the geological features (I'm a geologist) is amazing. It just puts us humans into context.

## Favourite pastime

Playing (serious) croquet. If you've never done it, you don't know what you're missing: have a look at lan's videos on www.basingstokecroquet.co.uk

## Favourite object(s)

My model railway locomotives, rebuilt to look a bit more like the real thing. Take a new model out of the box cut bits off, add bits on, re-paint and re-line: voila! (Several weeks later!)



## What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the Bible: Exodus

This month we are looking at Exodus, the second book of the Old Testament. Its name means departure, reminding us that Israel's flight out of slavery in Egypt is the major focus of the book.

Exodus is a book of two halves! The first part (chapters 1-19 & 32-34) is the story of an oppressed people who are delivered from slavery into a life of freedom. The second half (chapters 20-31 & 35-40) consists of detailed instructions about the life and worship of God's people. The book introduces us to their *salvation* or deliverance, as *story*. God's promises to Abraham are fulfilled as the people journey to the Promised Land. He also renews His covenant with them at Sinai, expressed in the Ten Commandments (20: 1-17). At the heart of Exodus is the person of God Himself. In chapter 3 God reveals His name as YHWH or *'I am who I am'* (3:14) to Moses. This is the name by which God is known throughout the Old Testament, expressed in the title *'the LORD'*. To know God's name is to know Him, as well as His character ie His justice, truthfulness, mercy, faithfulness and holiness. He is the God who controls history, delivering the people out of Egypt, while the death of the Passover lamb points us to Jesus' death on the cross (1 Corinthians 5:7).

God's promises of help remain true for us today: 'Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the LORD will bring you today' Exodus 14:13.

'This Exodus story continues to be a major means that God uses to draw men and women in trouble out of the mess of history into the kingdom of salvation.' (Eugene Peterson).

On the Toybox Charity website they have a 'Street Child's Christmas Wish List', which reads: To have a legal name of my own; To be allowed to go to school and sit my exams; To see a doctor when I'm sick or injured; To be protected by the law; To be kept safe from abusers, traffickers and criminals; To be allowed to get legally married when I'm older; To have dignity, confidence and feel valued; To be treated as a human being; To have my Birth Certificate.

#### Dear friends,

As Trustees of Shoemakers, we would like to begin by thanking you for your continued generosity, support and prayers for Shoemakers over these many years. Shoemakers celebrates its 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary this month – a wonderful testimony to God's faithfulness and provision over this time.

As you will know, we have been uncertain of Shoemaker's future for some time now. Demand for Christian books and resources has dropped dramatically over the years and independent booksellers are fast disappearing. It has become clear that the current operating model is not sustainable and significant changes have to be made. To this end, the Trustees have made the difficult and sad decision that Shoemakers will cease to operate as a book and resource seller. The last day for the shop will be **Saturday 3 February**, which will be Steve Wood's last day as shop manager.

Steve has been part of Shoemakers' story for its entire life, and we thank God for his faithful service for these 20 years. With his extensive knowledge and experience of Christian books and resources, his willingness to listen to people and be there for them, he has embodied all that Shoemakers was set up to do. We wish him every blessing for the next chapter in his career.

Going forward, there are plans being put in place. We currently occupy the shop premises rent free until new tenants are found, though we are not sure when this will be. Our intention is to continue with the shop after 3 February, opening on Saturdays only initially, in order to clear any stock left over and until we are given notice. We are also looking into other ways that we can use the premises, continuing to be a Christian presence on the high street, during this time. For example, the prayer space will continue. Such possibilities will be dependent on volunteers and finances.

Looking further ahead, we still believe in the vision for a non-denominational Christian centre in Newbury. We're not sure whether Shoemakers as a charity will have a part in this, but we are confident that, if it is God's will, he will bring it to pass in his own time and in his own way. Please join us as we continue to pray into this.

To mark these last 20 years, and consider the vision for the future, we intend to hold a thanksgiving service in the next few months. A date is yet to be confirmed, but we will let vou know when this has been arranged.

Thank you again for all your prayerful and generous support. We continue to trust in our faithful God and that he remains good in all his ways.

## **Basingstoke Town Chaplaincy**



**Dear Supporters** 

One of the Christmas booklets Chaplains give out speaks of Christmas being for outsiders. The centre of the Christmas story is a baby of dubious conception, born away from home in a cattle-shed with a price on his head who becomes a refugee. Chaplains meet people who also have messy lives, often not of their own making, whom we want to support and introduce to Jesus and his family.

An asylum seeker told me recently that the thing he liked best about Basingstoke was the friendship of people he met, especially at English classes and games afternoons – run by Christians being welcoming to whoever we meet, as Jesus was, and being faithful in all things, as God is towards each of us.

Recently we have been able to give encouragement and support to a number of people, helping them in the challenges in their lives and encouraging them to look to Jesus. We cannot give details but please pray that they will journey and come to know Jesus in their lives.

Please pray for the small team of Chaplains this Christmas as we greet people in the shopping centre and meet people in the Magistrates' Court, bus station and shops to share the hope of Christmas. We will be present with the Salvation Army as they play on Saturdays. Pray that:

- we will engage with people
- we will be drawn to those who are seeking answers in life
- we can encourage people to attend a church service

We continue to need more Chaplains to provide a regular service to those who work in the town, go to the Discovery Centre or visit shops and other places. Please pray, and maybe suggest to a friend at church, who is reasonably outgoing, that they consider becoming a chaplain.

Also pray for the good of the town. Rough sleeping will be greater this year for various reasons, shop staff face more abuse than usual at this time of year. Street Pastors, a sister organisation whose leader now shares our office, need your prayers too as they will be kept busy with the increased revelry over the Christmas and New Year period.

Thank you for sharing in the ministry of the Chaplaincy.

May you experience the joy and hope God offers through the Christmas message and may God be with you always.

This year we want to continue to look at the effectiveness of our ministry, especially as the number of Chaplains is low, and to see where we can develop our ministry and draw others into it. We also want to strengthen our links with churches in the area because they are the ones who will further the initial links we make with people wanting to find out more of the Christian faith and, hopefully, want to live as followers of Jesus Christ.

They need a welcoming church and we need to be able to point them to the right church for them.
