





Canon Paul Hardingham looks forward to Paris...(PP) The Olympic Games

This month sees the start of the Olympic Games in Paris. In describing the Christian life as a marathon race, the writer of Hebrews (12:1-2) challenges us to finish well.



'run with perseverance the race marked out for us' (1)

The Christian life is like a marathon not a sprint race, which calls for endurance. The course is *marked out* for us, as we all have a unique race to run, with its opportunities and difficulties. God knows our path and will provide all that we need to complete the race.

'fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith' (2)

The runner keeps their focus on the finishing line and avoids all distractions. Our focus is on Jesus, who has run the race before us ('author'), but is the one who can show us how to finish well ('perfecter').

We are also surrounded by a 'great cloud of witnesses' (1)

These are God's people, both past and present, who are cheering us on! During the 1992 Barcelona Olympics, the British athlete Derek Redmond was running in the 400 metres semi-finals. About 250 metres from the finish his hamstring tore, and he fell to the ground in pain. However, his father ran on to the track to support him in completing the race. Let's not forget that whatever we face, God is there beside to enable us to finish the race!

Church of the Living Stream flows on

Just a year ago many of you attended a celebratory service to mark the end of 111 years of local witness by Kempshott Methodist Church. The congregation had taken the bold decision to focus on on-line worship and to make the world its parish.

I am happy to report that this venture has achieved much more than we were achieving latterly in our building. We have two regular weekly on-line events, each at 10.30 am in the morning. Sunday offers a brief interactive service with opportunities for congregational contributions and discussion. Hymns are supported by thought-provoking images and those who wish to sing can join in, as long as they mute themselves to avoid confusing Zoom with unwanted feedback.

Wednesday mornings are more informal and are based on three hymns following a particular theme. Different individuals read individual verses and people feel free to share experiences and ideas. There is a prayer time in which individuals and current causes of concern can be brought before God. It is a time of warmth and fellowship.

Our participants come from a wide area including, on occasion, Zambia and the United States. We have individuals who have discovered us on-line and have become regular members of our fellowship. These are based in St Albans, Liverpool and Uckfield, Sussex.

In addition we have a website where prayer requests can be placed. Prayers can be posted on this site and our Minister has provided interesting U-tube messages.

We meet in person once a month for a home communion led by Claire and we make use of the HT 2000 to support our singing. This attracts those of our fellowship who have not made the leap to on-line worship, but remain a valued part of our fellowship.

Our intention was never to poach people from other circuit churches, but to offer a different approach for those who are house-bound, not feeling up to attending church on a particular Sunday, or travelling away from Basingstoke. People who have moved away from here remain with us on-line.

Our building has proved useful in the last year in providing a venue for a thriving dance school which was evicted from Westside Community Centre because of the problems with crumbling concrete. It looks as if it might be taken over by a different Christian Community which will offer an alternative approach to worship.

As we move into our second year we look forward to making our presence felt in the larger community which will be the new circuit.

Enfolded in Love

Our thanks to Rev Angela Webb and David Webb for the June Retreat at Silchester, the theme being "Enfolded in Love", a Day with Julian of Norwich. It was indeed a day to remember.

Julian was a theologian, mystic and anchoress of the late 14th Century and is known for the revelations she received over a period of time relating to God's Love. Her writings, yes she was a woman, are the earliest surviving English language works by a woman. In her first revelation she is shown a vision of a hazelnut in the palm of her hand (see picture). A hazelnut of itself is a small insignificant item, however at that time they were well known, and commonly used in food recipes. On asking "What may this be?", she is told, "It is all that is made". From this came further revelations that all things from the smallest and most inconsequential in God's Creation are made by the **Love** of God, and that all have a purpose in His Creation.

During the Retreat we were invited to take a walk out onto the adjacent Common and to take our time to look in detail at the many small items of wildlife that we would find there. This was very rewarding as we found small, unusual plants and flowers, in various stages of growth, and the insects, bugs and beetles living on and around them. There were varieties of butterflies, wasps and bees feeding on the flowers and pollinating them (see picture). I noted that the detail designs on each of the many flowers of the foxgloves were individually unique (see picture)!

We also had the pleasure of listening to the birdsongs around us in the peace of their natural environment without any distractions. There were many species that I did not recognise calling to one another, or simply taking pleasure in their songs. We were fortunate that one of our group had an App on her mobile phone that enabled her to record the birdsongs and download them. The App then informed her of the name of the bird with a photo. This she shared with us giving us a greater understanding of the variety of birds present and their songs. For the bird lover this App is a great asset.

What we were seeing and hearing was a living natural ecology from its very foundation, in action all around us, and it reinforced our understanding that there was a purpose for all this! God **Loves** His Creation! He made it for the benefit of all aspects of Creation, including ourselves, so that we can all live together in harmony. To quote again Julian of Norwich, "God made everything for **love**, and by **love** all things are sustained and protected, and ever shall be."

Clearly there is very much more of God's Creation that we do not fully understand. We know this already from watching recent episodes of Springwatch on BBC2!

Why not take the time to come along to the next Silchester Retreat in August, "The Vine & the Branches". You will have the time to take a walk on the Common to see and appreciate for yourself the **love**, peace and tranquillity of God's ongoing and active Creation.

Remembering the Faith of Eric Liddell – 100 years ago at the Paris Olympics

The 2024 Paris Olympics (26 July – 11 August) will soon be here. It was 100 years ago this summer, also at the Paris Olympics, that a young science student at Edinburgh University, Eric Liddell, ran an astonishing race that caught the imagination of millions worldwide.

Liddell had been born in China in 1902, to Scottish missionaries there. Early on, he had made a deep commitment to Jesus Christ, and sensed he was being called to spend his life in serving others. But Liddell was also an outstanding sportsman, playing rugby for Scotland before settling on athletics.

When he was chosen for the Paris Olympics, he expected to run his preferred 100m. But then came the news that the race would be run on a Sunday, and Liddell refused. Quickly, he trained for the 200m and 400m. He took bronze at the 200m, but no one expected much from him at the 400m. Instead, he won, and even broke the world record in the process.

After the Olympics, Liddell felt God calling him to his life's work. He went back to China, to teach in a Christian college. As the Second World War loomed, he sent his wife and children home, but stayed on himself.

By 1943 Liddell was confined to a brutal prison camp, where he shone among the fellow prisoners – encouraging them, teaching Bible classes, and praying for both his fellow inmates and the prison wardens. Deeply malnourished, his health failed and in 1945, just months before the war ended, he died, aged only 43.

In 1981 his story was made into the Oscar-winning film *Chariots of Fire*.

King Charles accepts the Patronage of National Churches Trust and Bible Society

Queen Elizabeth II was the patron of both charities, but following her passing, her patronages underwent review. Now King Charles has agreed to continue with his mother's legacy, saying he would be "delighted" to accept them both.

King Charles said his faith is "deeply rooted" in the Church of England. On his accession to the throne, he told faith leaders that he was "a committed Anglican Christian" and promised at his Coronation to "maintain the Laws of God and the true profession of the gospel."

Chief executive of the National Churches Trust, Claire Walker, said: "We are honoured to welcome King Charles III as Patron. This highlights the significance of UK churches and the important role of the National Church in keeping these wonderful buildings open and in good repair."

Bible Society's chief executive, Paul Williams, said: "We're absolutely delighted with this news, and very thankful. This is an affirmation of the value of Bible Society's work in sharing God's Word at home and abroad." **PP**

Audio visual update - July 2024

Last month I shared some thoughts and questions about how to position the projector screen to enable as many people as possible to see it and also to ensure that there was a significant and visible cross during the service.

I have had a number of conversations with both former St Andrews and Trinity people, and those who are and are not members of Church Council about the issues. I have not spoken to everybody and I am very happy to talk to anybody about these plans if you have comments or suggestions.

Church Council met on 10th June and after some discussion agreed that we should move the screen to where the current lower cross is, and slightly reduce this cross, and move it to the wall behind the pulpit. The BB colours and plaques would move to the other side, and the hymn board removed, with other measures to share the hymns being used in the service.

By the time you read this, the only work to have been undertaken is likely to be the move of the colours and plaques and removal of the hymn board. We are currently looking at contractors to do the other work.

In my discussions with people I have used the word "canvas" to describe the front of the main hall. The idea is that there is a wall that we can use in whatever way is appropriate to enable, support and enhance our worship, and indeed work with the community in whatever way is appropriate. I believe that we will have a space that can be used flexibly according to the event or Christian season.

So I am keen to hear from anybody with thoughts about how to use this canvas. For instance, and it is by no means the only way to use the space, Church Council discussed the idea that we might have appropriate fabric hangings that would cover the screen when it is not in use. The artwork on the hanging could follow the Christian year, or just represent some element of our faith.

I believe we are on a journey about how we use the technology in the Main Hall to support our worship and discipleship. If you agree (or even if you do not), do let me know what else we need to do.

In the meantime, I am wondering:-

- 1. How should we use our canvas to help us all approach God?
- 2. How should we use this space to allow our preachers and worship leaders to share the Christian message more creatively and allow as many people as possible to understand?
- 3. If you like the idea of the hanging, what images should go on them, OR, are you able to paint, sew, crochet etc to produce the final hangings?

Church Council was also asked what else was needed so that we can share both our worship and facilities with as wide a group of people as possible. Claire posed eight possible situations that could exist in the church and wider community. Whether or not you have seen these, it would be good to hear your reactions to them. Alternatively, these examples might make you aware of a need that should be addressed!

- 1. How can we be sure that everyone is able to access and participate in what is happening at the front, especially if they have additional needs (hearing, sight, learning, mobility etc)?
- 2. What technology is needed to support sessions with Children's and Young People's work?
- 3. When the Mug & Biscuit is open, what technology could we use to support the dropin café?
- 4. When Maths tuition for students is taking place in the hall, the parents/carers stay in the Mug & Biscuit. How could technology be used to provide for this group as they wait?
- 5. Suppose we were asked by a small community group who would like to run some first aid training. The only space available is one of the two back sections of the church (there is already a church meeting booked in the sanctuary area). Some of the training requires access to the internet and screen. What could we offer?
- 6. Suppose we were asked to hold a large wedding reception that included a country dance with a live band as part of the celebrations. What technology might be needed?
- 7. Suppose we have a very large congregation for a funeral. There is an overspill of people into the small hall (and Mug & Biscuit). What technology would enable these people to participate in the service?
- 8. Suppose we were approached by an organisation that works to get people into paid work. They would like to work with us in the small hall to meet clients for appointments and help them complete forms on-line, access benefits etc. What technology might help us to do this?



Dr Peter Brierley reflects on Britain's Prime Ministers. **PP**

Prime Ministers

Britain had its first Prime Minister (PM) in 1721 when Sir Robert Walpole took the job; he was a Whig. In total thus far we have had 81 Prime Ministers; this excludes First Ministers and doesn't count separately an existing PM who wins the election and continues in office. If s/he loses but subsequently wins another term, each term is counted separately.

We have had 56 different people as Prime Ministers. The longest serving one was Sir Robert Walpole, who was PM for 21 years. In length he was followed by the Tory William Pitt the Younger in 1783, then by Robert Jenkinson, the Earl of Liverpool in 1812, also a Tory. These are the first three of PMs who have

three of PMs who have served over 7 years.
There were 16 PMs in the 18th century, 33 in the 19th, 25 in the 20th and so far seven in the 21st century. Labour and the early Tories had slightly more time in office than the number of Prime

number of Prime Ministers *pro rata*. Rishi Sunak is the first British Asian Prime Minister.

Although this was in the last newsletter, in the printed copies it was too small to read, hence I've typed it and repeated it. The format that I pick up has changed and is now much too small, but is alright for the email copies but not for the printed ones.



We all at the Town Chaplaincy trust that you had a joyful Easter.

The Easter message is one of amazing love. It is humbling but gives us hope and assurance – for ourselves and also to share with everyone else. Let's stay rejoicing in the risen Lord Jesus Christ!

Malcolm Read, who showed God's love and shared that Good News of Easter at the Bus Station, was commemorated on Maundy Thursday by Stagecoach South with a plaque which was unveiled by Malcolm's widow. The plaque installed on the Bus Station concourse is the way drivers and management wanted to express their appreciation of the pastoral care and friendship Malcolm gave for some 14 years.

Other people and organisations have also expressed how helpful it is to have an independent person willing to listen to people's concerns. But, we are in great need of Chaplains to do this. We are part of God's Mission (Missio Dei) reaching out to people who otherwise have little or no contact with Christians or the message of hope we bring. Please pray that God will call Christians in Basingstoke to show His love to others as chaplains. Could you give 2 hours a week to show care for others, or do you know someone who would be good at doing that? Even fortnightly would be a great help! We can discuss any specific role and give plenty of time to test the calling.

We offer taster sessions, training and full support. Wearing a uniform is helpful as people feel more relaxed speaking to a stranger they can identify. Having some listening skill helps a lot; as people unburden they can process their worries while the Chaplain listens. So, after a person feels they have been heard, an appropriate word and perhaps the offer to pray – there and then or later in the office – brings a calmness and means so much. We want to encourage engagement with God. We work in the courts, shops and other places of work. In addition, we have been asked to provide Chaplains to 3 Christian organisations working in Basingstoke along with engaging at the railway station and 2 care homes. We cannot provide anyone for these places at present. So a new Chaplain could have a sitting down role, enjoy a stroll in the park (Eastrop Park!) or loiter with intent to care for someone in the town centre.

The police have been active in the town following up reports of shoplifting and dealing with drug dealers. We should be grateful to them but they are under a lot of pressure. Stress is bad for relationships and, like many people they have personal

concerns of different sorts. With the Police Chaplaincy we help to support all the staff. The Magistrates' Courts are similar, where the Chaplains provide a listening ear and calming influence to many stressed people. It can be a good place to talk about forgiveness and acting rightly or managing new circumstances. Please pray for all working in or otherwise involved with the police and justice services.

We continue to visit shop workers when there are fewer customers and hear people's concerns, which are often health, family and financial issues. We have recently visited with token Easter gifts, and have got to know some shop staff well over the years. We pray regularly for many of them, individually and collectively.

We are also engaging more with people of other faiths as opportunities arise. Several of us attended a recent breaking of the Ramadan fast at BCoT and we look to share views on various aspects of life with people of all faiths or none.

Please join us in praying for all who work in the town, that our community will be peaceful and supportive of one another and that Jesus Christ will be honoured more and more.

We have also enjoyed visiting churches recently to engage more. After all, we would love to see more of the people we meet attending a church and growing in Christ! Thank you for your support.
